

HENEY COMES TO BACK IN CHARGES

Attack on Senator Fulton Not Personal Nor Political, Says Prosecutor.

GOOD CITIZENSHIP MOTIVE

Declares He Has Accepted Challenge to Substantiate His Accusations, Will Speak at Exposition Rink Tonight.

"I have come back to Oregon because United States Senator Fulton is traveling over the state calling me a malicious liar and charging me with being in a conspiracy to ruin him. In order to show the people of Oregon that I am not a liar, it devolves upon me to substantiate the charges I made against Senator Fulton. That I shall try to do."

May Make Several Speeches.

Mr. Heney will make at least two public speeches, one at the Exposition Rink in Portland tonight, and the other in the public park at Salem Sunday afternoon. Whether he will make other addresses in other cities will depend largely upon the health of his wife, who is ill in San Francisco. In order to come here he left the drawing of the jury in the Fulton case to other attorneys, and he will probably take several days to draw the jury. Mr. Heney will be free to remain in Oregon long enough to deliver a half-dozen addresses, unless his wife's condition should become worse.

No Interest in Politics.

"Another thing I want understood is that my addresses are not political, for I have no interest in the success of any particular candidate, nor am I speaking in behalf of any party. The fight upon Senator Fulton would have been made upon any other man under the same circumstances had with the same record of citizenship as Senator Fulton. My plea is for good citizenship—a Democrat. My plea is for good citizenship—not for party or particular individuals. My plea is for good citizenship upon Senator Fulton because he is the last representative of that old and corrupt machine of Oregon politics which did so much to prevent good citizenship. My connection with the campaign arises from the fact that I was employed by the United States Attorney-General in 1903 to prosecute the land fraud cases of Puterbaugh and others and that in working on that case I learned of the operations of the political machine which has since been almost completely broken down.

"As I just remarked, my addresses are not political as that term is generally used and understood. Nevertheless I earnestly approve the conduct of Senator Fulton. My connection with the Municipal Association in deciding not to take charge of the meeting is an address here in Portland. The association is doing a great work for good citizenship and I am proud to be connected with it. My telegram and other arrangements were made suggested conference with the Municipal Association because I spoke under the auspices of that organization when last in Portland.

Hall Charge Most Serious.

"I am told that the people of Oregon consider the bribery of J. S. Smith the most serious charge made against Senator Fulton. To my mind the Hall deal, by which Fulton sought to secure protection for political friends, is a more serious matter, for it strikes directly at the administration of justice and proposes to place the man with political influence in a better position before the law than is possible to the ordinary citizen, who is held accountable for his acts.

INTEREST IS HIGH AT SALEM

Reported Heney Will See Legislator Who Signed Affidavit.

SALEM, Or., April 10.—(Special.)—Salem expects startling developments in the Heney-Fulton-Smith case. Attorney McMahon returned this afternoon from a flying trip to Albany, and left again tonight for the South, declining to state his destination. There is considerable interest in the case, and the reputation of being a fighter.

ORCHESTRA NEAR DISBANDED

Defalcation Occurs in Seattle of Funds for Salaries.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 10.—While Seattle music-lovers were enjoying the strains of "Faust" Thursday afternoon and evening, the managers of the company were having a feverish time to complete financial arrangements for keeping the Chicago Symphony Orchestra together. The difficulty arose over the defalcation of \$24,000 of money belonging to the orchestra. The financial report of the finance bureau in Washington, upon whose supplies the orchestra is traveling, collected the \$24,000, which was to be used in Seattle for paying the salaries of the half a hundred members of the orchestra and some traveling expenses.

Landlady Swears Warrant for Man Heir to \$1,000,000 Estate.

SEATTLE, April 10.—(Special.)—Yesterday Henry Owen forwarded to England papers which establish his identity as heir to one-tenth of a million dollar estate left by his uncle. Today he was arrested on a charge of having defrauded his landlady of a \$10,000 bill. The complaint was sworn to by Mrs. Rose Bogel, a boarding-house keeper. Owen, who is employed by the Seattle Electric Company, and his brother William, who is employed at the Meadows racetrack, are heirs to one-tenth each of the estate of their late uncle, Ellis D. Jones, who died in London last December. The estate, mostly in London real estate, is worth considerably more than \$1,000,000.

BARNETT FREE AT LAST

Indicted Banker Puts Up Bond in Three Courts.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10.—Walter J. Barnett, who was one of the directors of the defunct California Safe Deposit & Trust Company, was released from custody tonight after having been in the County Jail for four months. There are three charges against him, one of embezzling the Colton securities, one of embezzling securities and bonds of the Sacramento Valley Bank, and one of stealing \$20,000 worth of notes.

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CLOTHING CHEAPER

Prices Come Down With New Labor Conditions.

RIHORN IS BROUGHT HERE

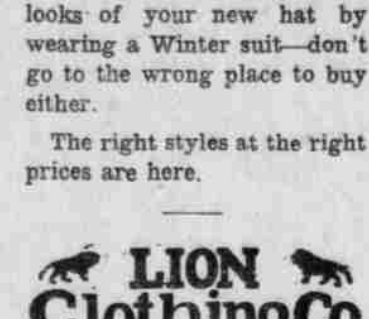
Returned From Tillamook on Charge of Non-Support.
