No fortunes are going to be won and lost on the result of today's pri-mary election. Whether it is the lack of interest in the outcome, or because the guessing is too tough, there has been comparatively no big money wagered on the results. wagered on the results. For two days past a bet of \$500 on Fulton's chances of receiving the nom-ination over Cake, offored against \$406, has gone begging. All told there will be hardly \$1000 bet on the election. Men who usually take a filer about election time are fighting shy of get-ting their money into action, and the bulk of the money wagered up to last night was placed by the candi-dates themselves. Around the elect stores where election money is handled very little betting has been noticeable.






