SAYS HE BEAT BRISTOL

Senator Kittredge Admits Full Responsibility in the Matter.

ST. LOUIS, Pa., April 17.—(Special.)—An issue of veracity has been joined between Senator A. B. Kittredge, of South Dakota, on the one hand and Francis J. Heney, special assistant to the Attorney-General of the United States, and W. C. Bristol, of Portland, Or., former appointee to the position of District Attorney, State of Oregon, on the other...

While in the heat last winter Heney, who prosecuted land-fraud cases in Oregon and suggested Bristol for District Attorney, gave an interview to the New York Times in which he called attention to the fact that Bristol's confirmation by the Senate was defeated by a subcommittee composed of Kittredge, Penaker and Callahan...

Opponents of Senator Kittredge in this state took up this charge and tried to make of it an argument against his reelection. Accordingly, Kittredge, in his campaign speech, devoted some 2000 words to an explanation of his connection with the Bristol matter...

At this point in the letter Senator Kittredge pauses and explains: "These men were clients of W. C. Bristol in the letter Bristol asks for the commission from the Coos Bay Land & Investment Company, and refers to 'relations with my clients, as of course I cannot assume to act for widely different interests at the same time.'"

This is the letter Kittredge says was presented to him when his subcommittee was considering the Bristol appointment. He asserts further that the charge was investigated by members of the Department of Justice and the conclusion reached that Bristol was unfit to be District Attorney.

Bristol's side of the controversy is that a special report was submitted to the Senate subcommittee February 2, 1904, by Special Inspector T. B. Neuhausen, showing that Page & Hoberg were not his clients at all and that, were they, could not have sold them out; that the clients to whom he referred in his letter were Callon, Toal & Minton and the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company, who were interested in an indirect way.

In a letter written to Fred G. Huntington of Aberdeen in reply to an inquiry from Huntington as to the facts, Bristol says in part: "I never represented James E. Page or Frank Hoberg in any direct or indirect way, nor was I ever directly or indirectly employed by them in any matter or thing whatsoever."

Both Page and Hoberg have made affidavits in which they state that they have no recollection of any communication with Senator Kittredge, which they describe as a matter of no importance.

Senator Kittredge will know that the contents of this letter were read and decided upon by the subcommittee and that after that his nomination was sent back and that again after the committee was sent back for the third time.
