In to the present time Congress, at the present session, has exacted no general legislation of importance, except the employers' liability bill. The rurency bill has gone through the Senate, but it is meeting with determined opposition in the House. The ship subsidy hill passed the Senate, but it can not get out of the House on minities; no progress has been made with the proposed amondment of the Shorma and trust law, no practical relief has been granted ine publishers who are clamoring for the removal of the duy on wood pulp; there has been no publicity elections law put through either branch and no action on the bill demanded by shippers all over the country, amending the rate law in the matter of increased tariffs.


