

BANQUETS AND DAY OFF THE NAVY—MAKING

Officers and Men of Battleship Fleet Are Guests of Los Angeles.

BIG DOINGS FOR JACKIES

Programme of Sports Includes Boxing Carnival and Barbecue Dinner in Honor of Admiral and Commanders.

LOS ANGELES, April 20.—A long day of merry-making by the sailors of the American battleship fleet, boxing matches, barbecues, baseball games and Wild West shows being included in the entertainment provided by the city was brought to a close tonight with two big banquets—one to the petty officers at the largest rate in the city and the other to the admirals and commanding officers of the fleet and members of their staffs.

Rear-Admiral Charles M. Thomas, in command of the fleet, responded to the addresses of welcome while among the most speaking to sea toasts were the Rev. Robert J. Bordeette, Right Rev. Bishop Thomas J. Conaty, Henry W. O'Melveny and Captain A. A. Price, United States Army. A vacant chair marked the place originally assigned to Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans. The latter, though absent because of the illness which keeps him at Faso Robles hot springs, shared in the tributes of the evening.

One-Fourth of Men Ashore.

One-fourth of the men included in the entire enlisted force of the fleet came ashore to take part in the festivities, planned with characteristic Western hospitality in their honor. There were 3000 sailors and marines in the liberty parties landed from the four divisions scattered at the various ports a score of miles away. Once on the beach they found free training and recreation, as well as their commands, and, arriving in the city, they found all manner of comforts and conveniences freely placed at their disposal.

Repeat Programme Today.

The barbecue and Wild West show, which followed the boxing tournament, ended much to the good times ashore, and tonight the blue jackets of the sailors and the tiller, soldier-like uniform of the marines have full possession of the brilliantly illuminated streets. The programme for the entertainment of the enlisted men to be repeated tomorrow, Wednesday and Thursday, in order that all of the sailors may have an equal share in the city's reception party.

Dine in Bower of Roses.

The big gilded dining-saloon of the Hotel Alexandria had been closed to guests for four days, while the preparations for the banquet were in progress, and tonight it was in reality a bower of roses, vines and blossoms. The air was deeply laden with the fragrance of the mingled flowers. The entry-way was an arbor of flower-twined latticework. Above the tables, seating 26 guests, a trelliswork had been constructed, and in this way, side-walk and ceiling all were covered with roses, poppies, geraniums, lilies and the myriads of flowers that abound in Southern California.

Thousands Visit Ships.

Thousands of residents of Los Angeles and visitors to the city went aboard the battleships again today, the transportation lines to San Pedro, Long Beach, Redondo, Venice, Ocean Park and Santa Monica having all their cars do to handle the crowds. The vessels were open from early morning until late afternoon, and at times their decks were crowded to their utmost capacity. Most of the people visiting the ships had never been aboard a vessel of the first class before, and their interest knew no bounds. Bluejackets ushered them above and below decks, the ship bands played for them, and their hour or two spent in the big fighting craft gave them a new idea of what the American Navy is and means.

Japanese Tact Conspicuous.

Members of the local fleet reception committee and the people of Los Angeles in general have commented most favorably upon the diplomacy and tact displayed by the Japanese colony in participating in the welcome to the officers and men of the battleship fleet. Throughout the Japanese quarter of the city, which extends over a considerable territory east of First street, the decorations of stores and buildings conducted and occupied by Japanese have been relatively as costly and extensive as in any part of the city. American and Japanese flags are entwined together and portraits of Admiral Evans are hung in places of honor. A prominent Japanese business man was one of the guests at the great banquet given at the Hotel Alexandria tonight in recognition of the substantial contribution to the entertainment fund raised among the Japanese.

TWO CRUISERS AND FLOTILLA

TWO CRUISERS ORDERED TO PORTLAND

Talk to Fleet by Wireless.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—Wireless telephone stations are to be installed at the ferry depot during the stay here of the Atlantic fleet. The ships are all equipped with this apparatus and from the ferry station it will be possible to communicate with Man-of-war Row by telephone. The harbor commissioners granted the necessary permission today.

KEEP FLEET ON THE COAST

Commercial Club Tells President Ships Are Needed in Pacific.

That the battleship fleet should be stationed permanently on the Pacific Coast was the sentiment expressed in a communication addressed to President Roosevelt yesterday by the board of governors of the Portland Commercial Club. The growing commerce of the Western Coast is referred to and the necessity of protecting it from foreign interference. The communication is as follows: We respectfully petition for proper and adequate naval protection for the Pacific Coast of the United States. We realize that with the growing commerce of the Pacific, this coast is to be the scene of the struggle for commercial supremacy and that no nation in the supremacy more essential than to the United States.

BORAH MAKES HIT IN MAIDEN SPEECH

Contends Negro Soldiers Were Guilty and Deserved Punishment.

WINS SENATORS' APPLAUSE

Idaho Senator Sweeps Away Doubt About Facts of Brownville Riot, and Incidentally Opposes Mercy to Orchard.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Senator Borah today and established his right to rank

NO MERCY TO LAWLESSNESS.

Discussing the enormity of the soldiers' offense, he declared it to be treason, if not technically, then morally, saying: "The times when an air of disapproval pervades certain parts of the social life of the Nation, when a strike and murder takes its trochroous hand here and there, playing with human life as with a toy; when the doctrine of riot is preached as a part of party organization—under such conditions, and in the spirit of lawlessness, this spirit to maintain law and order, and to inspire both respect and dread in all who so lightly wish the worth of human life or who are so ready to compromise, to negotiate, to excuse—would be an injustice and a blot upon the honor and good name of that great army whose patriotism has been subjected to the Army and constitute trifling with the Government for protection to life.

Admits Receiving Bribes

Harlan Testifies Against Benson and Hyde on Land Frauds.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Although the session of the Criminal Court today in the trial of Hyde, Benson, Schneider and Dimond, on charges of conspiracy to defraud the Government of valuable public lands in the states of California and Oregon, was extraordinarily brief, it furnished the greatest sensation yet produced by the Government. Woodford D. Harlan, for nearly two scores years a clerk in the General Land Office, was the star witness and he made free confession of receiving five hundred dollars to expedite the land selections and to divulge information relating to the boundaries of proposed forest reserves.

Chester Has Quiet Down.

CHESTER, Pa., April 20.—The second week of the streetcar strike appeared today, with the company apparently in control of the situation. Cars are running with no opposition. Ten of the employees of the company who quit work last week were reinstated today. The city is quiet today and it is believed all danger of another outbreak is past.

Burglars Set Store on Fire.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 20.—Fire, thought to have been of incendiary origin, damaged the store of S. Grossman on East First street, to the extent of \$1800 early this morning. The blaze is thought to have been started by burglars, who looted the cash register of \$200, and afterward set the place on fire to cover the robbery.

MOVEMENT BEGUN TO RELEASE THAW

Lawyer Will Apply for Habeas Corpus Writ, Denying He Is Insane.

CONDITION HAS IMPROVED

First Step Taken for Liberation From Asylum Is Signal for Battle With Jerome—Evidence of Sanity Promised.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., April 16.—The first step in the release of Harry K. Thaw from the Matteawan Asylum for the Insane was taken today. James G. Graham, of Newburg, of Thaw's counsel, made application to Justice Morschauer, at White Plains, for an order directing the superintendent of the asylum to permit Thaw to sign a formal application for a writ of habeas corpus. The order was granted, and when Thaw has made the application he will probably be brought before a Justice for a hearing to determine whether or not he is sane.

SAYS THAW PERFECTLY SANE

Lawyer Confident of Release, but Jerome Will Oppose.

NEW YORK, April 20.—James A. Graham, of Newburg, who was engaged by Harry K. Thaw about two weeks ago to take legal steps to bring about his release from Matteawan Asylum, said tonight that the application made to Justice Morschauer at White Plains for the order to permit Thaw to sign an application for habeas corpus was a preliminary step to a hearing to determine the sanity of Thaw. Mr. Graham added that it would be probably several weeks before the application was made for a writ of habeas corpus. Mr. Graham added: "Since I was retained in the case by Mr. Thaw about two weeks ago, I have made a careful study of his condition and am perfectly satisfied that Harry Thaw is a sane man. There is a deep question in my mind as to the sanity of the Government, but I do not intend to assert the majesty and reliability of the Government in vain. I will inspire both respect and dread in all who so lightly wish the worth of human life or who are so ready to compromise, to negotiate, to excuse—would be an injustice and a blot upon the honor and good name of that great army whose patriotism has been subjected to the Army and constitute trifling with the Government for protection to life.

WOMAN HINTS AT SUICIDE

MRS. BOSBY GOES AWAY AND LEAVES PATHETIC NOTE.

J. H. Covey Says She Is His Wife. Friends Said to Know Where She Is.

The whereabouts of Mrs. Florence Bosby, alleged by J. H. Covey to be his bride of three months, was a matter of police investigation yesterday and last night. The young woman, who is 18, left her mother's home at 251 Marguerite street in her home on Saturday, leaving behind a letter suggestive of suicide. The letter was dated Saturday and reads as follows: April 18, 1908.—My Dear Mother: Don't grieve for me when I am gone, as I am better off and I go with the hope of some day meeting you there. I will not write to Fannie, as it would upset her school, but will let you break it to her and say way you think best. Tell her the things are not as much as I would like to have her say, but all I had. Tell Henry to try not let this matter interfere with his chances in the future. There are plenty more better than I will ever be. No one knows what I have done in the past few years, but I hope this was ended now. With love, I am, your daughter. I intended mailing this when I saw Henry's but know you would get it if I left it here.

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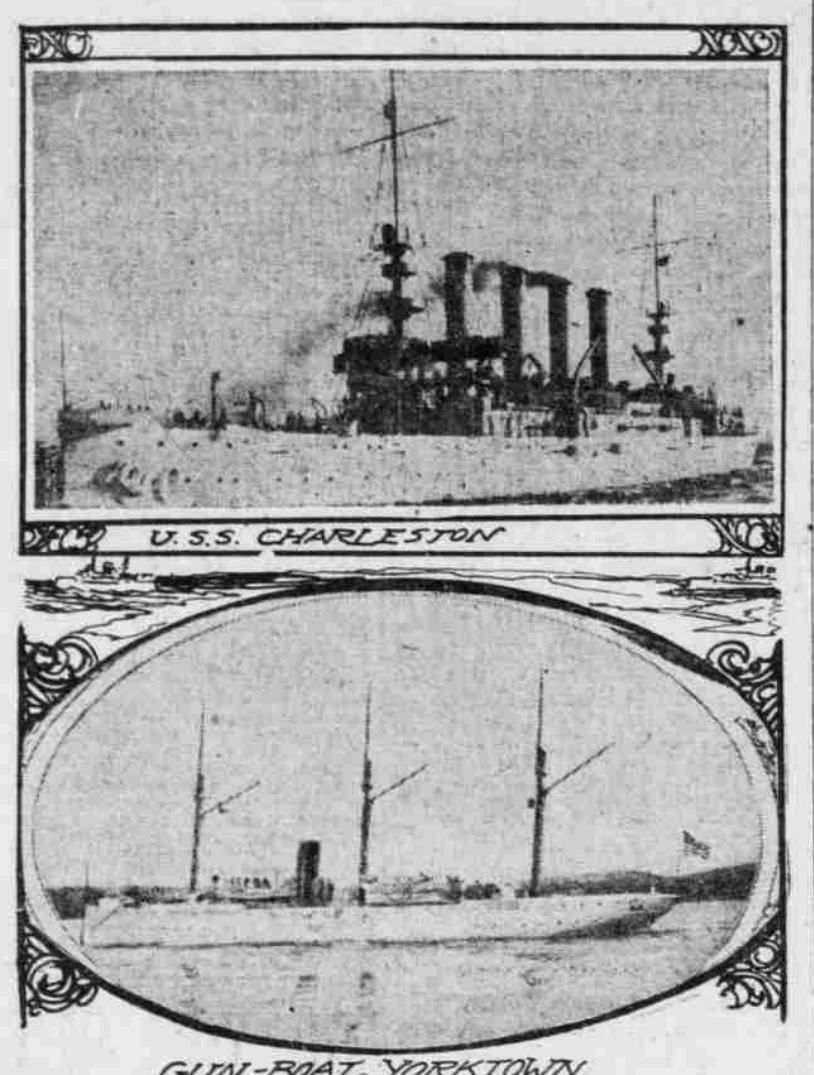
