

MANNING & STEEL PROSECUTE STEEL

Threatens to Indict State Treasurer for Conversion of Funds.

STEEL DENIES ALL GUILT

It is Charged His Relations With Ross and Other Bank Officials Were Criminal and Conviction is Promised.

District Attorney Manning yesterday announced that he would indict State Treasurer Steel for his conversion of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company's funds.

It is learned at the District Attorney's office that the indictment has been returned against J. Thurston Ross, John Atchison, T. T. Burkhardt and George H. Hill, but for the fact that they were wanted as a witness for the prosecution and had been indicted he would not have been available in that capacity.

Threatens to Indict.

"I propose to indict State Treasurer Steel for his participation in the conversion of the educational funds of the state to the use of the officials of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company," said District Attorney Manning last night.

"I am not prepared to say on what grounds Steel will be indicted and cannot say until I have concluded an investigation I am now making. It is possible that he will be charged with converting the educational funds of the state to his own use by turning it over to the Title Guarantee & Trust Company's bank as a check deposit.

Relations Were Criminal.

District Attorney Manning is convinced that the relations of Ross, Burkhardt and Steel were much closer than was brought out at the Ross trial because of the unwillingness of Steel to answer questions. It is also considered probable that knowledge of the investigation Mr. Manning is making of Steel and his relations with the bank books is such that it is probable that he is still another charge on which the state may be indicted.

Receiver Appointed.

After fully investigating the affairs of the Outlet Clothing Company by its creditors, it was decided to appoint a receiver to take charge. The assets amount to \$188,000 and liabilities \$109,836. It was learned at this meeting that since the money tummy last fall the Outlet Clothing Company has been a losing venture, and the creditors decided to wind up the affairs of this company as quickly as possible and realize whatever they can through the receiver.
