PIONEER IS CALLED

Simon Blumauer Passes Away After Short Illness.
CAME TO OREGON IN 1852
Was One of Public-Spirited Merchants Who Sent Provisions to Needy Immigrants on Plains.
Funeral to Be Thursday.

Simon Blumauer, a pioneer resident of Portland, died at his residence, the southwest corner of Morrison and Sixth streets, yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. He had been confined to his bed since two weeks ago Sunday, and his death came from the usual debility of age. He was born in Bavaria, March 2, 1832, and was, therefore, at the time of his death, about two months over 76 years of age.

Funeral services will be held Thursday forenoon at 10 o'clock at the Jewish cemetery in the afternoon, and interment will be at the Jewish cemetery.

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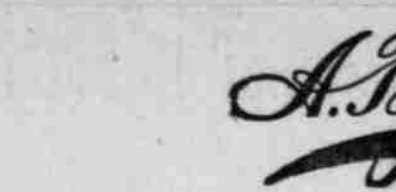
