

FIRST GAME FOR HOME FANS TODAY

Beavers and Seals Will Give Ball Bugs Initial Taste of Sport.

BIG PARADE IS PLANNED

Players and Prominent Patrons of Coast League to Participate in the Event—New Stars Will Appear.

The long-looked-for and happy day when Portland fans will be afforded the long-looked-for opportunity of witnessing McCredie's new team in action is here, and at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon Umpire Fred Perrine will shout the familiar old "Play ball!" and the season of 1936 will be formally launched at the Vaughn-street grounds.

Previous to the opening of hostilities between the Seals and the Beavers ceremonies appropriate to the occasion will be held. One of the features of the day will be the big street parade of automobiles and other conveyances carrying the balltossers, city officials and prominent fans to the ball grounds.

Portland, for the great interest manifested in the present team, in spite of its low position in the pennant race, is more prominently evident than in any previous season in Portland's baseball history.
