The only counties not confronted with prohibition are Multnomah, Clatsop and Baker. In Multnomah, 23 precincts will vote on prohibition...

All wet counties are: Grant, Harney, Josephine, Klamath, Polk and Washington.

DROWN MEASURE IN WORDS

Heyburn's Threat Against Dry Land Homestead Bill.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 18.—Senator Heyburn served notice today on the Senate that he intended to talk to death the 33-acre dry farm homestead bill...

When the conference report on the bill was submitted to the Senate, Fulton, Borah and other opponents of the conference committee had attacked the words, "Arid and semiarid," it being their contention that with these words included homestead features which would permit a person in order to acquire title, to buy land without reading thereon.

Heyburn opposed the bill on a number of grounds, declaring it would permit speculators to acquire large tracts of land in prospective irrigation districts for the sole purpose of holding up companies which contemplated constructing irrigation systems.

After Heyburn had debated the bill for an hour, Senator Wheeler withdrew the conference report and it is possible that the words "Arid and semiarid" will be restored in order to secure the support of Senators other than Heyburn.
