

OPEN SESSION HELD Federated Trades Council Engages in Debates.

SINGLE TAX AND LIQUOR

E. S. J. McAllister Defends Single Tax and Ralph R. Dunwady Attacks It—Stono Speaks for Prohibition.

Speaking before an open meeting of the Federated Trades Council last night, E. S. J. McAllister declared that, regardless of whether or not the pending single tax amendment to the state constitution should be adopted by the people in June, the single tax theory as a whole would be submitted by initiative petition at the general election, June 1, 1910.

While the subject advertised to be debated was the pending single tax amendment, Mr. McAllister stole a march on his opponent and spent most of his time in a discussion of the plan of taxation proposed by Henry George.

In this connection the speaker said he was opposed to the assessment of personal property for the following reasons: That it imposes a burden upon those least able to bear it, and because it places a fine on labor and industry and a premium on idleness.
