

REGULATED MARKET

Prices Working Down to New-Crop Basis.

MAY OPEN AT 75 CENTS

There is still some demand from California for wheat, but it is not active as it was recently. The price of wheat on California accounts were several cents above export values, and with the subsidence of the Southern buying, the local market is dropping back to the export basis. The trade yesterday quoted club wheat at 88 cents and bluestem at 90 cents.

Supplies in the country are practically exhausted and the million or so of bushels left to sell will doubtless be taken before the season closes if the holders are willing to let go. There is a difference of opinion as to what prices the new crop will open at, but it is believed by many it will be on the basis of 75 cents for wheat and 80 cents for bluestem in the interior. All will depend on weather conditions from now on.

Trading in the oats market is quiet. Prices at present are fairly steady and cannot be held much longer, and a decline to the new-crop basis is looked for soon. The barley market is very slow.

PLENTY OF CALIFORNIA FRUIT TODAY

A straight car of apricots and a mixed car of peaches and plums will arrive from California today. The apricots will be quoted at \$1.12 1/2, the peaches at 90¢-91¢ and the plums at 75¢-76¢.

A New York fruit receiver, who has been investigating conditions in the West, is quoted by the Journal of Commerce as follows: "Last year about 100 carloads of Spitzenberg apples in boxes were sent from Oregon and Washington to California. This year, nearly double that quantity will be shipped. In Newtown pippins the same situation exists. From Washington, Cal. last season about 250 carloads of Newtown pippins were sent out, the great bulk of which went to England. The crop of these apples in that section may amount to 250,000 bushels. In Colorado the freeze did much damage and they will have about 1000 carloads of box apples, mostly Winesap, Jonathan and Home Queen, in place of about 3000 carloads expected."
