

ROAD TO COVER FIVE COUNTIES

Wasco County Electric & Power Co. Plans Immediate Construction.

TROLLEY LINE 200 MILES

Will Be Built South From Condon. Goes Up Deschutes Valley—Connects With Corvallis & Eastern. Contracts Are Already Let.

An electric railway project that will cover five counties of Eastern Oregon has been mapped out by the Wasco County Electric & Power Company.

The company was incorporated on May 15, with a number of Portland men in the directorate.

Good Backing Promised.

The bonds will be \$4 and will run 20 years. They are first mortgages upon the physical property of the company.

The plan of the company is to build up the Deschutes Valley to its headwaters in the Cascade Mountains and thence across the range in the neighborhood of Mount Jefferson to a connection with the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad at Detroit.

It is the expectation of the promoters to have the new road well along before winter and to push the work during the next six months, when it is believed the weather will be such as to permit of grading operation and the construction of water power plants.
