Central America to Fight as Pre- Bishop Somewhat Stronger Than on liminary to Union.

MEXICO CITY, July 3 -- According to unofficial advices from Central Americs; trouble in that region is looked for in the near future. If predictions contained in letters and telegrams from the region prove to be well founded the

work of the Washington Peace Conference will have been of no avail.

The rumors are to the effect that Salvador and Guatemala are to align themselves against Nicaragua and Honduras and that the outcome of the trouble will be the ascendancy of Jose Santos Zelara, of Nicaragua, or Es-trada Cabrera, of Guatemaia, as the leading figure in Central American poli-tica. Later will come the union of the five Republics into one nation. Either Cabrera or Zelaya will then dominate in the new Republic.




