HISTORY OF PIONEER FLAG—No more patriotic specimen of "Old Glory" is displayed in Portland this morning than the one at home. It was first made at the home of Mrs. A. E. Bills, corner of Sixteenth and Flanders streets. Forty-seven years ago—the Fourth of July, 1861—saw it unfurled for the first time. Portland was a small place then and flags—and a good many other things—were not procurable by the pioneers with the ease that they are today. But the struggle for the existence of the Stars and Stripes was begun, and Mrs. Bills was resolved to show her colors. The flag had to be made at home. It was made at the home of Mrs. A. E. Bills—the late Cincinnati Bills—the component parts of the banner were cut out and sewed together. It is 10 feet long by six feet broad, and carried the 34 stars that appear at the Union on that historic date. The stripes of red and white are made from goods known as "all-wool delaine," and the blue ground to which the stars were attached was a material familiar to the past generation as "French merino." The flagstaff, a goodly sapling, was procured from Seaside. Today this grand old specimen of liberty is old and somewhat faded, but its patriotic owner would soon to exchange it for the finest and newest silken banner that could be obtained here.

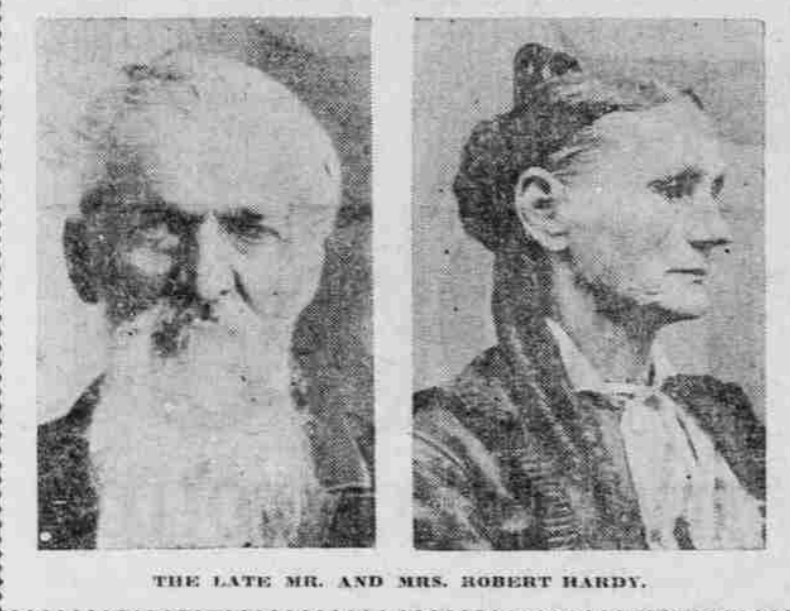

WILL PLANT WALNUT TREES

NEW COMPANY BUYS 960 ACRES NEAR GASTON.
Purposes to Subdivide Land After It is Planted and Resell in Small Tracts.

A tract of 960 acres of land in Washington County, two miles east of Gaston, and heretofore owned by A. H. Tanner, of this city, has been acquired by the Walnut Plantations Company, which has commenced the preliminary surveys and will begin planting walnut trees as soon as the ground is in condition this fall.

The company purposes to plant the whole tract to English walnuts and peaches, and expects to have the work completed in two years. It is the claim of the company's officers that this will make the largest walnut plantation in the world, as the whole tract is in one body.

The Walnut Plantations Company is a new corporation, which was incorporated this past week. The stockholders are A. Crofton, J. R. Rogers, John H. Hall, S. C. Spencer, H. Beckwith, F. S. Wilson and F. E. Manchester, and they have elected a board of directors, which has in turn chosen these officers: H. Beckwith, president; John H. Hall, vice-president; S. C. Spencer, secretary-treasurer; F. E. Manchester, manager.

FAVORS SALOON ORDINANCE

Measure Excluding Women From Bars Recommended to Council.

The City Council Committee on Health and Police, at its meeting yesterday morning, voted to recommend for passage by the main body, an ordinance excluding women from saloons. An amendment, defining a dining-room to be a place with not less than 400 square feet of floor space and where meals are served, was added to the original measure, drafted by City Attorney Kavanagh at the request of Councilman Driscoll. There is a provision in the proposed law which exempts grocery and drug stores and public dining-rooms from the terms of the ordinance.

Councilman Baker, who opposed passage of the measure when it was up before the City Council at its last regular session, swung into line yesterday, when the amendment as to dining-rooms was put in. He said that he wished to see women kept from saloons, but he believed that the ordinance, as originally drafted, discriminated against saloons in favor of cafes and restaurants. He now stands with those who will vote for passage of the proposed measure. It is believed now that it will pass the Council next Wednesday without much opposition.
