of the Speaker. This, he declared, was nothing less than autocracy, and he demanded a change. The speech was applauded by the committee.

Bid for Negro Votes.

William T. Ferguson, of Washington, D. C., secretary of the National Negro Political League, which he said contains 500,000 members, was called on during the session. He assured the committee that the party would have the support of the negroes, providing they could receive assurance of fair treatment. He told the committee frankly that if the Democratic party should prove successful by the aid of the negro vote, the negroes would expect to be the "spoils" of the party.

SUGGESTIONS BY LEADER

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No Suspension of State Laws.

Mr. Bryan also believes an injunction plank as thus transmitted are that the plank should begin with the statement that the party resents any attempted reflection upon the judiciary of the country; that not only are the courts themselves created by law; their jurisdiction and authority are defined by law, as well as their rules of procedure. 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Only Adequate Navy.

On the subject of the Navy, Mr. Bryan cautions the committee to be careful not to endorse a "large navy." "An adequate navy," he says, "is as far as we can go. DUBOIS FACTION WINS

Mormons Defeated in Idaho—McCarren Again Thrown Out, Though He Makes Bitter Threats of Party Defeat.

DENVER, July 8.—The committee on credentials of the National Democratic Convention concluded its labors shortly after 10 o'clock today, after having been in continuous session since 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mormons Beaten in Idaho.
