

ACCUSED PRINCE DEFENDS HIMSELF

Zu Eulenberg Says Witness Terrorized Into Making Charges.

KISTLER'S GREAT SERVICES

He Excuses Excessive Interest in Man on Ground of Valuable Work—Extravagant Language Written to Emperor.

BERLIN, July 16.—Prince Philip zu Eulenberg's condition is such that the court which is trying him was obliged to adjourn today after brief session. The Prince was brought into court on a stretcher, his every appearance indicating suffering.

Beginning with today, the presiding judge allowed one newspaper reporter to be present at the trial to supply such accounts of the testimony as are not inconsistent with the public morality. The Prince, in a weak and shaky voice, replied to questions put to him by the court.

Why He Boosted Kistler. When asked to explain the rapid promotion of Herr Kistler, a court councillor, to whom the Prince was unusually friendly, the Prince related at length Kistler's services as his private secretary, his gift for letter-writing and his ability in indexing documents, etc.
