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NO CASH FOR FIGHT

Honduras Has to Sell Railroad to Raise It.

AMERICANS GET PROPERTY

Soldiers Refuse to Fight Until Money and Food Forthcoming--Rebels Capture Towns, but Are Defeated Finally.

PIERTO CORTEZ, Spanish Honduras, July 17, via New Orleans, July 21--It now develops that the delay in moving troops to suppress the uprising at different points in Honduras was due to the fact that the treasury was absolutely empty. The soldiers refused to march until money and provisions were furnished them, and in these desperate straits the government was forced to dispose of one of its most valuable pieces of property, namely, the Honduras Inter-Oceanic Railroad.

In the latter engagement the revolutionists were badly defeated and were pursued by government troops, but escaped into Salvador, carrying their wounded with them.

Think War is Inevitable.

GUATEMALA CITY, July 21--According to information reaching here today from Nicaragua and Honduras, these two Central American States are about to become plunged in war. The reason for this is the help given by Nicaragua to the Honduran revolutionists. The violation by Nicaragua of her treaties of peace has caused indignation throughout the Central America.

Marietta at Puerto Cortes.

WASHINGTON, July 21--The gunboat Marietta has arrived at Puerto Cortes on the north coast of Honduras.

Plans to Teach the Insane.

CHICAGO, July 21--Treatment of patients at the Dunning Asylum for the Insane, instead of merely holding them in custody, is a new departure to be launched today by a class of 25 hospital attendants which has been studying at the Chicago School of Civics and Philanthropy. Miss Julia Lathrop, one of the directors of the school, believes the insane have the mentality of children in different stages of development, and that it may be developed by teaching such subjects as are taught in the kindergartens.

Fire Devours Wool-Pullery.

LOS ANGELES, July 21--Fire today destroyed the wool-pulling establishment of the Kaufman-Davidson Company, hide, tallow and wool dealers. The loss is about \$53,000, partly covered by insurance. For a long time the fire threatened the Standard Oil Company's plant, located directly in the rear.

INQUIRY IS ASKED

Report on Treadwell Mine Stirs Up Western Federation.

NEEDS FEDERAL PROBE

Organization Authorizes Executive Board to Assist in Calling Government's Attention to Alaska Corporation's Doings.

DENVER, July 21--By unanimous vote this afternoon the Western Federation of Miners instructed its executive board to use its influence to secure the appointment of a Federal commission to investigate conditions in the Treadwell mining district of Douglas Island, Alaska. This action was taken following a report on that district made by Yanco Terachi, a delegate, who charged that conditions were "something awful." He asserted that hundreds of miners were killed annually by reason of poor timbering; that when a man was killed the companies reported him as having "quit work" and that all efforts of relatives or friends to trace his movements afterwards were fruitless. He charged that the Governor of Alaska always lobbied against any investigation.

His report was strengthened by the report of the executive committee which was practically the same as his as to conditions.

The proposed amendment to the constitution providing for state organizations with no central head, was killed.

An amendment providing that no member should join any military company unless ordered to do so by the Governor, was killed.

W. D. Haywood, ex-secretary-treasurer,

addressed the convention, advising closer relation with the United Mine Workers, and he also thanked the members for the support they gave him when on trial in Idaho for the Steunberger murder.

Daughter Inherits Secret.

NEW YORK, July 21--Baden Karolyi Tomasowzky de Ferency, widely known in Europe and credited by experts with having re-discovered the Cremonese varnish, is dead at Far Rockaway from diabetes, from which he had long suffered. He was 48 years old and is survived by a widow and one daughter. To this daughter, a violin maker of ability, he gave the secret of the Cremonese varnish on his death. Ferency, who came from a famous family of Budapest violin makers, came to this country several years ago at the solicitation of several wealthy violin enthusiasts of Denver, who believed that in the dry air of that section it would be possible to get excellent results in the making of instruments. The project met with considerable success, the new instruments bringing high prices, but the altitude and rarified air that was such an aid to Ferency in so far as his art was concerned, was too much for his constitution, and after several months spent in that district he died. He was forced to return to the coast.

Killed in Automobile Wreck.

PITTSBURGH, July 21--Dr. E. B. McGraw, a well-known physician, was instantly killed and Andrew S. McGowan, manager of Duquesne Park, and the Traction Company Parks, of the city, was slightly injured today in an automobile accident. The two men were driving from New Kensington to the city in the doctor's runabout. At a sharp turn in the road at Springdale the steering mechanism broke and the car dashed over an embankment, turning turtle. The doctor was caught under the machine and his life crushed out.

New York Taxes Higher.

NEW YORK, July 21--The tax rate this year to be officially fixed by the aldermen at their stated meeting today, will be 1.61, according to authoritative information received yesterday. This is a 13-point advance over last year, when the rate was 1.48. It applies only to Manhattan, but the increases in the other boroughs will be made the same.

BUTTE RIPE FOR LYNCHING

ONLY AWAITS ASSURANCE ROGERS KILLED HENRY.

Desperado From Youth, He Is Accused of Shooting Man After Hands Went Up.

BUTTE, Mont., July 21--Paddy Rogers, boasted bad man and all-around desperado, is in jail for the murder of Michael Henry in a saloon upon the outskirts last Saturday night. Henry was carried from his home to the cemetery, three miles away, upon the shoulders of 30 miners, who took this dramatic method of protest against the lawlessness reigning in Butte.

The Henry murder occurred during a saloon hold-up. While his hands were up, Henry was shot through the heart at close range. The men engaged in the robbery were masked, but several witnesses declare the murderer is Rogers.

Rogers was tried and acquitted a few years ago for the murder of an old man in a saloon brawl. When a mere boy he was wanted on a robbery charge and fled into the hills, rifle in hand, and defied the police for weeks. He was captured later near Lewistown, Mont., brought home and finally dismissed. He has figured in several shooting scrapes with the police.

Lynching is now openly talked of, if Rogers' identity as the masked murderer of Henry is established.

Forty Hurt in Wreck

Electric Cars Collide on Interurban Near Chicago.

CHICAGO, July 21--Nearly 40 persons were injured, some of them probably fatally and 10 seriously that they had to be taken to hospitals, in a head-on collision today between two Aurora, Ill., Chicago electric cars at Lovelade station, four miles north of Aurora. The disaster occurred when the coaches were each running at a speed estimated at 40 miles an hour. The crash when they came together was terrific. Both cars were tele-

scoped more than half their length, the wood in them smashed to splinters, the iron twisted and gnarled out of all semblance to its original shape and seats thrown yards away.

Passengers, among whom were nearly 50 workwomen, were thrown through windows and tossed to the side of the tracks several feet away. Just after the wreck occurred, the cars caught fire from the trolley wire and began to smolder, but the unharmed passengers put out the blaze with water from a nearby rivulet, and dragged the injured to places of safety. The most seriously injured were taken to Aurora and near-by houses in automobiles and farmers' wagons.

Passengers on the two cars realized the danger just before the motorman jumped and there was a general rush for the doors, which many reached before the cars came together. They leaped off and escaped with only a few bruises. Others in the cars, including almost all of the women, were on board when the cars smashed into each other.

Sends Welcome to Farman.

NEW YORK, July 21--A wireless message was sent by the Aero Club of America yesterday to Henri Farman, on his way here from Antwerp on the Steamer La Touraine, reading: "Aero Club extends welcome. Public enthusiastically expecting." Mr. Farman is expected to arrive on Friday. The Aero Club has outlined a series of receptions for the aeronaut between his flights, at Brighton Beach race-track which will begin next week.

Insure Against Black Hand.

NEW YORK, July 21--A new form of freak insurance recently issued by Lloyds of London, is "black hand" insurance, which has recently been taken out by neighborhood in New York in the districts where dynamite outrages have been most frequent, for the reason that ordinary fire insurance is no protection against damage by explosion unless it is followed by an actual fire. It is said that "black hand" policies have recently been taken out to cover a number of the Astor tenement-house properties in New York.
