NEW YORK, July 22.—There was no constant trend in the course of prices of stocks today. Ups and downs succeeded each other all day. Extreme uncertainty of speculative sentiment seemed to be experienced by the number of fluctuations. Efforts to trace the operations going on by the larger interests were unavailing.

The speculative contingent has looked forward to a decision of the Standard Oil's appeal sgainst the \$29,000,000 fine loyled upon it with lively interest. It was generally known that a decision would be refidered today and the Wall-street public was keenly slert for the first news of its character.

When the reversal of the lower court became known there was much excitement manifest throughout the financial district and a jump in prices resulted. Standard Oil Stock itself rose 16 points in the outside market. It has been supposed that the shadow of this fine hanging over the Standard Oil Company has been a restraining influence on the activities of capitalists in that going and that the winning of their case would result in increased activity on their part.

It has been argued also that a good effect on the general movement of capital might be expected, owing to an interpretation of such decision as additional assurance of safeguards for right of capital and property. The effect in the stock market, however, proved to be short-lived. The first buige in prices was taken advantage of to effect a free disposition of speculative profits. The skyrocket advance in Westinghouse Electric following violent movements yesierday was of no benefit to the general market and proved rather unsettling to sentiment. 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
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
