ABERDEEN, Wash. Aug. 35.— (Special.)—Aberdaen's new Park Board will be composed of two women and one man, the ordinance creating the board passed by the Council providing for the appointment of women. Mayor France put the women in the majority. Mrz. William Irvine will be chairman and the two other members are Mrs. John C. Hogan and Waldo W. Hart. Mrs. Irvine was born in Aberdeen. She is the daughter of the late Alexander Young who, with Samuel Benn and the late James Stewart, founded the city. Mrs. John C. Hogan is the wife of the City Attorney, who is also the Representative in the Leg-islature from this district. Mr. Hart is president of the Council and also of the Board of Education. The ordinance under which they have been appointed creates a Park Board and provides for a system of parks. It is the plan of the new board to secure, if possible, a number of sites for parks. They will have for the creating of a park fund the dog licenses and such other money as the Council anay direct or may be given by the people.
