

SALE OF NEW HOPS

First Purchase Made by Wolf & Son, of Silverton.

PAY 6 1/2 CENTS FOR FUGGLES

Speculation as to the Cause of Prices in the Later Market—Unfavorable Harvesting Weather in England.

The first purchases of baled hops of the 1908 crop in Oregon have been made by A. Wolf & Son, of Silverton, through 725 bales of Fuggles in the Silverton section.

Contracts were made by Julius Weiss & Co., of Salem, yesterday at 7 cents. The sellers were Mrs. Fred Knapp, of Chemung, 15,000 pounds, and August Helich, of Woodburn, 12,000 pounds.

On one point the trade has united, and that is the coming crop at this time many of them are well supplied with old hops and some of them have hops to sell out of their surplus stocks.

Without the other hand, the market is not upon its strong points. The reserve stocks in the Western States are arranged for the entire season, and when they are gone and buying sets in earnest, there will not be much of a supply to draw upon.
