Aftermath of the Lawson Campaign. American Smelting Breaks Badly - Railroad Earnings Reports Are Poor.

NEW YORK Sept. 3—Selling of stocks by apeculative holders today was induced by the perception that some of the assumptions on which they had acquired them were not well founded.

The conspicuous feature was American Smelting, which broke badly in continuation of its weakness of yesterday. This stock sold seven points lower than yesterday's best prices. The contraction in the year's earnings disclosed in the amnual report was supplemented, as an influence, by the small holdings in the name of the present management which appeared at the meeting yesterday. As an action was taken at that meeting toward placing on the board representatives of the Standard Odi interests, another hoped for source of strength was withdrawn from the stock. Intimations found credence that the recent flurry in the stock to high price altitudes had been made the occasion for large reductions of these holdings and of those of inside interests rather than for an increase.

The prominent place given to American Smelting in the widely advertised Lawson campaign made its example influential in raising fears of similar conditions to be met in other stocks. The metal and industrial group were most closely affected in sympathy and their weakness was aggravated by rumors of pressure to place copper metal by some of the larger producers make a mystery of their selling prices, so far as general public knowledge is concerned, and no reports of quotations from their selling agencies is obtainable. An estimate made by a French trade fournal of the total yield in wheat of France, and which indicated that it might be necessary for that country to import from 15,000,000 to 25,000,000 bushels of wheat, was another buillish factor of importance. Export houses here claimed that early bids for wheat for export were numerous, but the subsequent advance carried the market out of the export zone. A 2-cent advance at Minneapolis contributed to some extent to the sharp buige here.

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
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
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
