

BASE OPPOSITION TO OREGON LAWS ON FEDERAL COURT RULING IN 1893.

GOVERNOR NOT DETERRED

DECLARES THAT RECENT OPINIONS UP-HOLD CONCURRENT JURISDICTION OVER COLUMBIA AND WILL CONTINUE TO ENFORCE STATUTES.

OPPOSITION BY WASHINGTON FISHERMEN TO THE ENFORCEMENT OF OREGON FISHING LAWS ON THE COLUMBIA RIVER FROM SHORE TO SHORE IS BEING BASED ON A DECISION OF THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT IN 1893, WHEN IT WAS HELD THAT NEITHER OREGON NOR WASHINGTON HAD JURISDICTION IN THE COLUMBIA RIVER BEYOND THE BOUNDARY LINE BETWEEN THE TWO STATES WHERE LEGISLATION AFFECTING FISHING RIGHTS CONFLICTED.

PLANS MISSIONARY WORK

F. A. SEUFERT DENIES OFFICER'S RIGHT TO "STEAL" CARLOAD OF SALMON.

Seufert last night, preliminary examination was postponed by mutual consent, pending a more convenient time for both fishermen and Warden. The seizure of his car of fish was first learned by F. A. Seufert this morning upon visiting the canneries. Tonight Mr. Seufert said:

When anyone goes to your place of business and carries off your property you generally know what to call the act. The fish were mine and the Warden took them in my absence. It is true that I have placed the fish in the hands of my attorneys with instructions to arrest McAllister for taking the fish.

Mr. Seufert further stated that he was anxious to have the case tried out in the courts, that the validity of his state license might be proven. Meanwhile, Mr. Seufert signified his intention of closing the canneries and ceasing fishing for the season.

Washington Confident of Rights Under Old Ruling. SEATTLE Sept. 15.—Fifteen years ago the United States District Court decided that neither Oregon nor Washington had jurisdiction in the Columbia River beyond the boundary line between the two states where legislation affecting fishing rights conflicted.

Opposition by Washington fishermen to the enforcement of Oregon fishing laws on the Columbia River from shore to shore is being based on a decision of the United States District Court in 1893, when it was held that neither Oregon nor Washington had jurisdiction in the Columbia River beyond the boundary line between the two states where legislation affecting fishing rights conflicted.
