Well-to-Do Freewater Farmer Committed to Insane Asylum. PENDLETON, Or., Sept. 18.—(Special.)—Worry over the failure of his dewberry crop brought an attack of insanity upon C. O. Stewart, one of Freewater's prominent citizens. Wednesday night he worked hard in his orchard until Thursday morning when friends who had been guarding him induced him to come with them to Pendleton.
