Indiana Official Accused of Improper Conduct Exonerated.

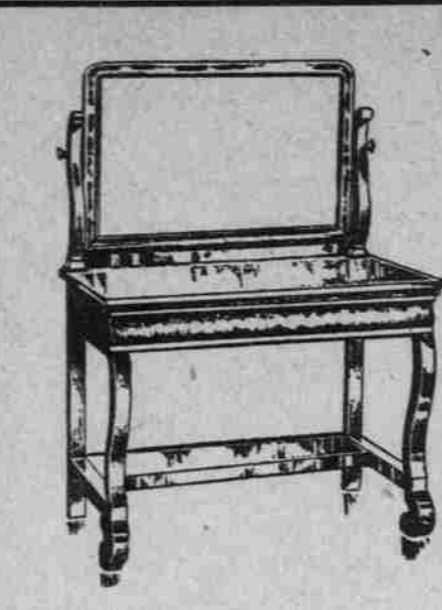

"Hanlon didn't have a chance at any stage of the fighting," said Referee Eddie Smith after the fight. "He was outfought from start to finish and fought the last 10 rounds on courage, pure and simple."

Oregon Man Denies Charge of Burning California Timber.

Deputy United States Marshal Nicholas returned yesterday from Klamath County, having in custody Louis R. Webb, a Southern Oregon timberman, charged with having willfully burned a tract of Government timber in Northern California.

Webb, through his attorney, John Edward Boyd, declares that his arrest is a piece of spitwork on the part of business rivals in California with whom he has fought and won several legal battles over various milling claims. He asserts his innocence of having aided or abetted the burning of any timber, and states emphatically that the entire proceeding is the result of a malicious and untrue charge.
