The programme to be presented at the concert of four grand opera stars in this city has been admirably arranged to reveal the best talents of the singers, and to give the patrons of the entertainment a chance to hear these great artists at their best.

Madame Marie Rappold, the new prima donna, who has been setting New Yorkers wild by the marvellous grace of her singing in opera, is no less glorious in concert. Josephine Jacoby's brilliant contralto voice was heard frequently in concert before she became a familiar figure in the Metropolitan Opera Company, and she is perfectly at home in choral work.

Both Riccardo Martin and Giuseppe Campanari enjoy occasional incursions into concert as a relief from the exacting opera roles, and are quite as impressive and effective in one as in the other.

All are members of the Metropolitan Opera Company, of New York, and all have reached the highest pinnacle of fame by their singing and impersonations of great opera roles.
