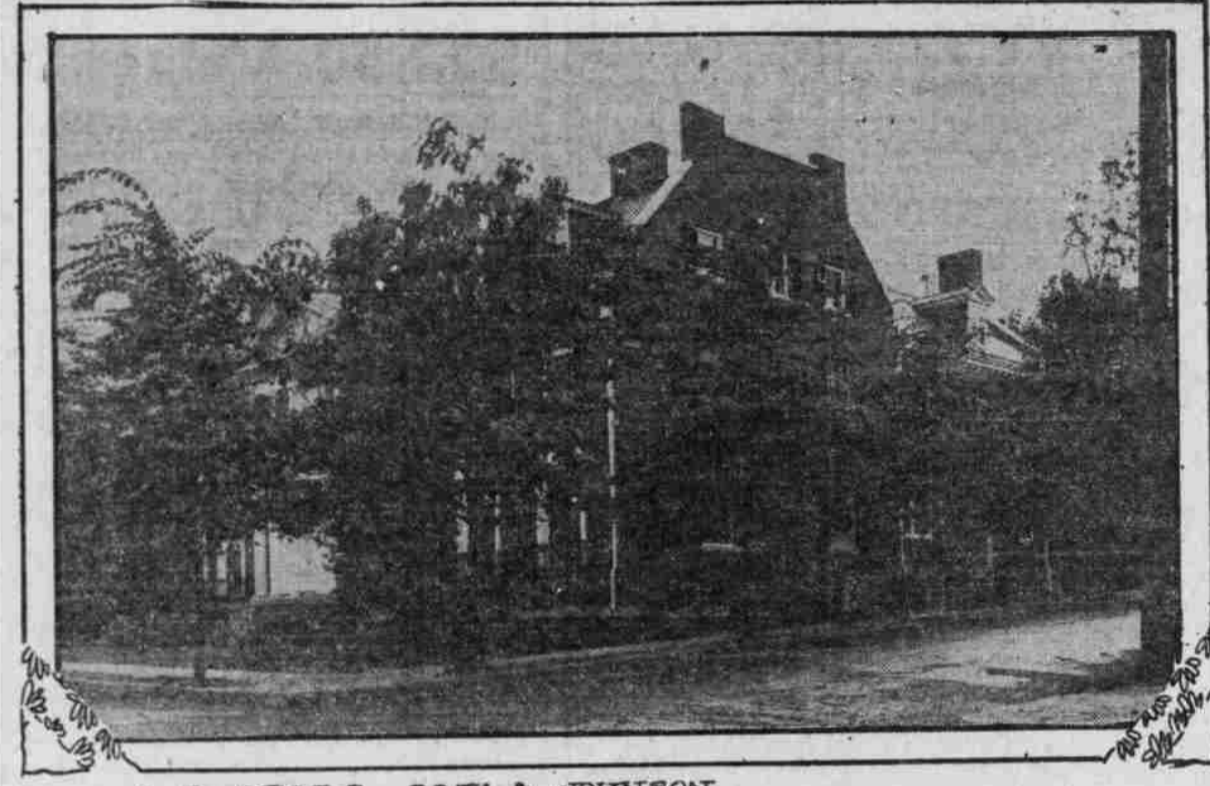
Threatened Tie-Up on Gray's Harbor Has No Significance Locally.

CUTTER RUSH HAD HARD TRIP

On Account of Ice Vessel Is Unable to Reach Point Barrow.

SEATTLE, Oct. 11.—The United States revenue cutter Rush returned today after a Summer's cruise in Behring Sea and Arctic Ocean. She reports much rough weather, September being so bad that practically the entire sealing fleet had to suspend operations.

Bricklayers have reached the second story of the Pacific Paper Company's building at Fourth and Ankeny streets, and Cook & Co. are completing the excavation on the Fifth and Ankeny quarter-block to be the site of Blackmore Company's warehouse and saleroom.

Buildings at Kenton, the tract near the Union Meat Company's packing plant site on the Peninsula, are under way. It is the announced intention of the owners of the townsite to continue building operations at least until the projected dwellings and business houses are completed.

The two-story brick at the northeast corner of Third and Ankeny is ready for roof. The building is to be occupied by stores on the first floor and a rooming-house on the other.

Fairly good progress is being made in the removal, bodily, of the brick warehouse of Mitchell-Lewis-Staver building from Fifteenth and Thurman for a distance of about two blocks.

Renting agents report that whereas flats and apartments were vacant in some localities for the last few weeks, owing to absence of families on vacation, there is now no such condition existing at present.

Purchase by Scott Brooke of the southwest corner of Twelfth and Washington streets for \$15,000 is reported by realty circles, and a figure about right for the locality.

Devlin & Firebaugh report the sale of a four-acre tract at Binley Station, on the Oregon City carline, improved with modern five-room bungalow for Letitia Labowitz to Alfred Allen. Consideration \$5000.

C. A. Bigelow, president of the East Side Business Men's Club, last week received assurance that work on the foundation of the East Side passenger depot will be started in about ten days.

The buildings of the Star Drill Factory in Thibault's Addition, have been completed and machinery is being installed. This plant is the largest which has been established on the East Side, and will employ a considerable force.

Contract for the new edifice for the Mississippi-Avenue Congregational Church to be erected on Shaver street and Missouri avenue was awarded to Sandstrom & Sprague for \$6000. Total cost will be about \$7000.

F. A. Harradon & Co. are having plans prepared for a two-story brick, 50x10, to be erected on East Sixth and Davis streets, by children of Lewis & Lewis. It will be occupied as a candy factory.

Russellville Grange has decided not to put up a hall this year, and will defect to the new hall at Spring. A quarter block has been secured on the Base Line road for the hall.

Work has been started on a one-story building on Grand avenue, near East Clay street, for the Star Brewery Company, to be occupied as a saloon. Cost will be \$1000.

A dwelling costing \$4000 is to be erected on Broadway, corner East Nineteenth street, for J. R. O'Neil.

Whitehouse & Honeyman have completed the plans and details for the new Alders High School, and it is understood that the plans will be kept open for bids for about two weeks.
