BIG CROWDS AT THE GRAND

During a meeting of the temporary committee of the City Temporary

Board yesterday afternoon, Isaac Sweet, one of the new members, declared that the Grand Theater allows more than the legal number of patrons to attend, and that it violates the law in this respect.

The matter came up in regular order when Clerk Weidner read the report of Fire Chief Campbell and his assistants on investigations of conditions in the Bungalow and Baker theaters, in which it was said that both were found to be in good condition, but that the committee deplored the fact that there is no law in Portland forbidding the production of plays in frame buildings.

Mr. Sweet asked if the Grand had been inspected of late, and when informed that it had been reported on as to its fire safety and that it had been approved, said that he wished to inquire as to whose duty it is to enforce the law relative to the number of persons to be allowed at the performance.

"The reason I ask this question," explained Mr. Sweet, "is that I attended a play there one night recently, and became greatly alarmed at the immense throng, which, he said, filled up the house so that, had there been a fire, many would have perished. An investigation was ordered by Mayor Lane.
