

BANK'S CASHIER TO ANY AND ALL

Trial of C. W. Morse in New York Discloses Shameful Misuse Public Funds.

ICE STOCK'S BIG ROLE

Worthless Paper Used Indiscriminately to Secure Loans From National Bank of North America. Clerks Grew Suspicious.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Operations in what witnesses said was a pool in ice stock were related today before Judge Hough in the criminal branch of the United States court, where Charles W. Morse, financier, and John F. Carroll, ex-chief clerk of the court of special sessions, and vice-president of the Fourth-street bank, Inc. produced several letters written about two years ago, some of which were over the signature of Morse. In these letters it was shown that Mr. Carroll had carried \$417,712 in "ice" stock in December, 1905, the proceeds of the investment having been used by the bank as a loan, with the stock as collateral. Three days later the transaction closed with a profit to Mr. Carroll of \$28,297. Mr. Carroll said that at that time he was operating with Charles M. Schwab, John W. Gates, Isaac Guggenbuhl, Charles Barnes and Morse. The firm named was manager of what Mr. Carroll admitted was a pool.

DETECTIVE JONES DEAD

The deceased officer is survived by his widow and a brother, Joseph Jones, of this city, and other relatives in the East.

Mr. Jones was born at Muskegon, Mich., 36 years ago, and has been a resident of Portland for over 15 years.

On May 1, 1902, he became a member of the Police Department, and by steady and faithful attention to duty had earned

DEPOSITS PILE UP

Increase in Oregon Banks \$2,000,000 Since May.

REPORTS FILED AT SALEM

Individual Deposits Show \$75,600,000, With Banks Carrying in Cash \$12,700,000—Reports Are Dated September 23.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 19.—(Special.)—The banks of Oregon, both State and National, have \$1,000,000 more deposits than they had last July and about \$2,000,000 more than they had last May. This is shown by the statement issued today showing the condition of all State and National banks on September 23, the date for which the last statement was called. The individual deposits amount to \$75,600,000 and the banks are carrying in cash \$12,700,000, or about two-thirds per cent of the individual deposits.

OPPOSE TAX AMENDMENT

Spokane Churches Adopt Resolution Objecting to Proposed Change.

SPokane, Wash., Oct. 19.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the General Ministerial Association of Spokane, which includes nearly all of the Protestant churches of the city, a resolution was adopted strongly opposing state tax amendment to be voted on at the November election. The resolution was proposed by P. D. Hopkins, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and was passed without a dissenting vote. The resolution declares that certain influences are at work threatening to impose a burden of taxation upon the churches, and recommends that all members of the association inform themselves of the proposed amendment and present the question to their congregations.

GREEK SLAYER SENTENCED

Fifteen Years for Killing Countryman in Fit of Jealousy.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 19.—(Special.)—Clarence Pappas, a Greek convicted of murder in the second degree for the slaying of his countryman, Theodore Karalis, was this morning sentenced by Judge Irwin to serve a term of 15 years in the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla. E. H. Fox, attorney for Pappas, gave notice of appeal to the Supreme Court.

HEAVY RAIN; THEN SNOW

Winter Coating Covers Inland Empire and Idaho Districts.

SPokane, Wash., Oct. 19.—(Special.)—Snow has been falling over Central Washington and a small portion of the Inland Empire today. Camas and Nez Perce Prairies, near Lewiston, have been covered to a depth of two or three inches. Since the Nez Perce Reservation was opened snow has not fallen so early in the year.

DOES NOT FEAR SENTENCE

Martin Expects to Emerge From Prison Stronger Than Before.

Edward Hugh Martin, convicted of

mass slaughter for the alleged murder of Nathan Wolff, the first street pawnbroker, is to be sentenced by Circuit Judge Cleland at 2:30 o'clock this morning. Martin does not worry, apparently, over the prospect of going to the State Penitentiary for a term of years. When asked about it he remarked that he would rather be behind prison bars than ensnared by the morphine habit. He hopes that during his term he may be able to break the habit so effectively that he will be physically stronger when he is released.
