

COALER IS LOST IN MICRONESIA

Fifeshire, En Route to Portland, Goes on Coral Island.

MEMBERS OF CREW SAVED

Left Newcastle August 3 for This Port Under Command of Captain Nichols With Over 3000 Tons of Coal.

Carrying a cargo of about 3000 tons of coal for Portland, the British ship Fifeshire was lost at one of the Gilbert Islands on August 27.

The Fifeshire sailed from Newcastle August 2, under command of Captain Nichols, both vessel and skipper being well known in Portland.
