GREAT SPEEDERS TO TRY FOR VANDERBILT CUP. Interest of Autoists is Centered on Race Meet on Long Island Next Saturday. Nearly all the choice seats and boxes for the Vanderbilt Cup Race, at Long Island, next Saturday, have been sold and racing drivers for the past week have been getting their headquarters into shape around the 25-mile circuit. Practice has been going on for a week and it is reported some very fast trials have been made. The hours for speeding are from daylight to 7 o'clock A. M. and huge crowds of spectators turn out every morning to watch the racers. Chevrolet has been engaged to drive the big Mathewson racer and J. E. Ryan will pilot the Mathewson stock car which has been entered. Both are drivers of experience and the former is picked by many as a winner. He has figured before in the Vanderbilt race when he drove the 120-horse power Fiat in 1905. He came to grief in this race on account of a broken wheel. The two Knox entries are reported to be very fast in their tryouts, and will make a good showing. Leon Pouget has been selected by Harry Payne Whitney to pilot his big Buick. He is reported to have recently established a new road record for this country in an Isotta car, will drive the same car again in the Vanderbilt. 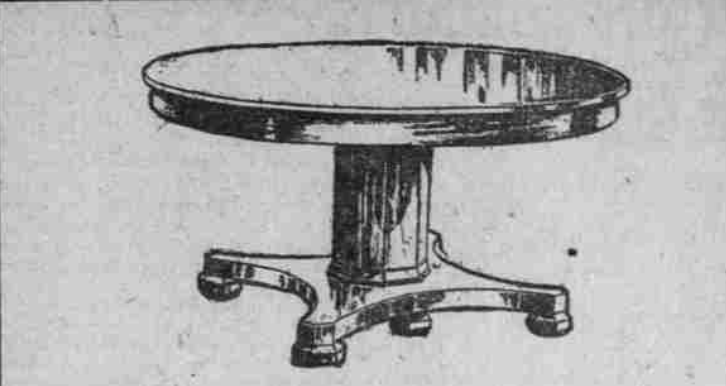
