MATE OF KUYAK TELLS STAR OF BENGAL WRECK.

No Signals Given-Hundred Lives Snuffed Out Through Gross Criminal Carelessness.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. EL-Fred Willke, mate of the tug Kuyak, testified today in the investigation of the wreck of the bark Star of Bengal on the coast of Coronal Island, Alaska, and the loss of Ill lives. It has been charged that many lives would have been saved if the Kuyak and tug Hattle had stood by with assistance. Willke testified that no signals were given to warn the Star of Bengal that the towline was to be out. He admitted that it was customary to give such signais, and did not know why none was given. He said that, when the line was cut, there was a rock between the ship and the tugs which it would have been impossible to pass.

We did not know she was wrecked until the following morning, when with a small boat we got within 109 yards of shore. We spoke to the survivors and they were satisfied to remain there until the sea calmed down."
