Among the difficult tasks he performed, and one that will remain a monument to him for many years, is the bridge across the Willamette River at Wilsonville. CONTRACT FOR NEW BOAT

Portland Yards to Build Steamer for Sound Traffic.

Contract has been swarded to the shipbuilding firm of Joseph Supple for the construction of another steamer for the Klisap County Transportation Company, of Seattle. The Supple concern built the Klisap about two years ago and the owners are so well satisfied with that boat that the contract for a sister vessel was awarded with the proviso that no expense is to be spared to make the new steamer better than the first one if possible.


