NIGHT OF JACK O' LANTERNS AND MIDNIGHT CHARMS HERE
Lillian Tingle Writes of Superstitions and Halloween Observances Handed Down From Ancient Times.

OUR friend, Jack o' Lantern, is with us again. For days and weeks past his cheerful grin has confronted us—in paper, paper mache and other feeble imitations of "the real thing" from almost every store window. Tonight, however, the amiable goblin himself will be abroad in the land and many a lively sheeted ghost is preparing "to squeak and gibber" in the streets, especially the suburban streets of Portland. I don't know just how "gibbering" is done, but I believe it is the correct thing in ghost society.

In order to get the utmost enjoyment out of Halloween it is necessary to be either a very old ghost or a very young mortal. If you are a very young ghost, you are probably awkward and feel your inexperience.

There must be very much to learn about the his and outs and real art of haunting, and if you are an old ghost, you are probably a connoisseur in the art of haunting. I mean the only thing for you to do on Halloween is to go to bed and wrap your head in the blankets. But if you are a young mortal, interested in the secrets of the future, Halloween is one of the most delightful nights of the whole year.

Apple peelings have a provoking way of making S's when thrown. This is very annoying if your favorite name for a boy begins with P or H; but "S twirls" will often help matters. But there are English, Welsh and Irish superstitions that still survive. The Halloween bonfires are of Druidic origin. The "Soul cakes" made and eaten at this season are probably connected with the gods of the Norse mythology, though a Christian signification was given later. And the drink of milk and cider, known as "Lamb-wolfs" (a concoction of apples and milk) as well as the divinations with apples and nuts, all point to the worship of the Roman Pomona.

You know the apple and nut divinations, and the "Lamb-wolfs" and cider to drink, seed cakes, tharta cakes, soul cakes, pumpkin pie, "turnments," doughnuts, apples and nuts to eat—these are an important part of the evening's preparations; but the charms are, after all, the chief thing.
