WOODRUFF SENDS GREETINGS

Congratulates Taft on Surpassing Roosevelt's Great Victory.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—State Chairman Woodruff at 10 o'clock tonight sent the following telegram to W. H. Taft:

"Your plurality in New York state is more than 200,000, thus exceeding President Roosevelt's majority of four years ago, as he so earnestly expressed a desire that it should. You have carried New York City by 5000 to 19,000 and Kings County by 15,000.

"Hughes plurality will be at least 50,000. His candidacy aided yours, and yours did his. Please accept the hearty congratulations of the Republican organization of the state of New York and all connected with the work of the campaign, which they have especially enjoyed with you as the party standard-bearer, in the Nation, and Governor Hughes in the state."

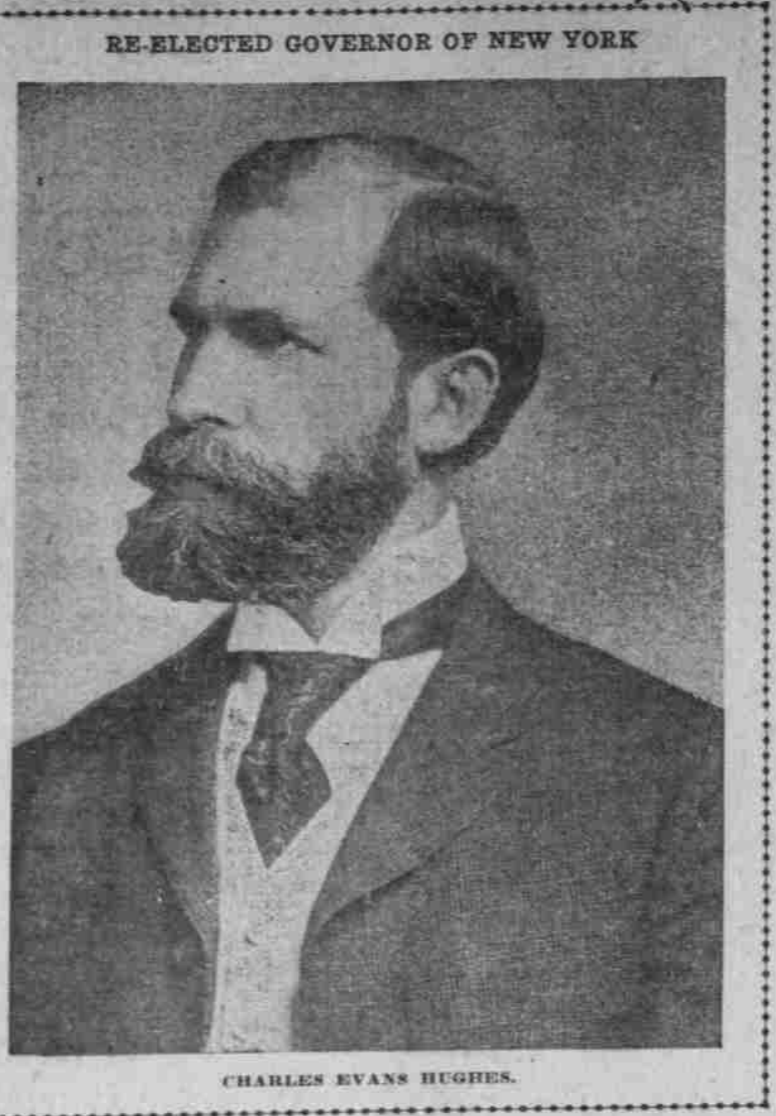
