FRAUD APPARENT IN REGISTRATION

Democrats Proved to Have Sworn in as Republicans for Purpose.

RETURNS UNCOVER PLOT

Comparison of Registration in All Parts of State With Vote Cast Bevenls That Underhand Methods Were Employed.

Praud in registration is piainly marked in the returns of last Tuesday's election. The fraud was committed mostly by Democrats, partly by Socialists and in small degree by Prohibitionists. All registered as Republicans and falsely sworn as members of that political party. But they cast their bailots for Bryan, Debs and Chafin, and in doing so boosted the vote of their respective parties far above their party registration. Under these circumstances, it would be expected that the Republican vote would fall below its registration. That is just fall below its registration. That is just

Although 85.396 electors registered as Republicans. Tait received only 62.171 votes, a falling off of 24.225. Although but 32,252 persons registered as Democrats. Bryan polled 39,000 votes, an increase of 7262. Although only 2154 persons registered as Prohibitionists, Chaffin received 2500 votes, an although only 2561 electors registered as Socialists. Debs received 7000 votes. These figures are compiled from complete returns from 26 out of 34 counties and from partial returns from the remaining eight remote and small counties. counties.

State Vote Analyzed.

In every county, fewer Republican votes were cast than were registered. In every county but five, more Democratic votes were cast than were registered, the five bing Baker. Crook, Lake and Union. The same was true as to the Socialists in every county except Baker and Coos, and as to the Prohibitionists in every county except Baker, Columbia, Coos. Polk and Sherman.

The total vote was 17 per cent short of the registered total, 123,125, and amounted to 111,595. This total vote and the registered vote were apportioned as follows:

S per cent short of the Republican registration, while the Democratic vote is III per cent higher than the Democratic registration, the Debs vote is hearly double the Socialist registration and the Chain vote is ID per cent higher than the Prohibition registration.

Kept Away From the Polls.

It appears, therefore, that I7 per cent of the registered electors of all parties did not reach the polls. This means that of the St. IS persons registered as Republicans, 14:57 failed to reach the polls and 71,769 voted. Of this latter number. Taft polled \$2,100: therefore, 1000 persons refer for Bryan, Debs, Chafin and Hisgen, who were falsely registered as Republicans. Most of them undoubtedly cast their ballots for Bryan.
