

### CLUB TAKES LEAD AGAINST GOVERNOR

#### Sellwood Voters Well Supported in Move to Elect Republican Senator.

### PETITIONS ARE PREPARED

#### President Upham Gives Grounds Upon Which It Will Be Asked That Legislators Be Relieved of Statement Pledge.

Initial steps to defeat the election of Governor Chamberlain as United States Senator by the Legislature at the Winter session have been taken by the Sellwood Republican Club. This organization has appointed a committee that is instructed to circulate petitions among legislators-elect of Multnomah County, who subscribed to statement No. 1, from many weeks elapsed similar petitions will probably be circulated in various other counties of the state from which Republican members of the Legislature were elected as statement No. 1.

### Hearty Support Is Given.

"In taking the initiative in the fight for a Republican Senator from this state, we are seeking mutual encouragement," said Harry S. Upham, chairman of the committee of the Sellwood Club, in discussing the plans of the organization yesterday. "We are convinced that a state which gave Taft a plurality of nearly 25,000 does not want a Democratic United States Senator. Although we have scarcely begun our work we have assurances of general support among the voters and they are not all Republicans either. Right in Sellwood there are Democrats who propose to sign off petition abolishing Republican members of the Legislature from all obligation under the statement pledge.

### Position Taken by Club.

"We maintain that Republican members of the coming Legislature, regardless of the question of the constitutionality of the statement, cannot live up to their oath of office and at the same time support for Senator a Democrat. This contention is altogether apart from the further objection that a Senator-elect who has pledged himself would not be according to the Federal constitution and, being in conflict therewith, would be illegal. The duties of Legislators in the election of the Governor are prescribed in the state and Federal constitutions."

The committee from the Sellwood Club first consulted with prominent constitutional lawyers in the city and some means might be presented by which the constitutionality of the statement and whether or not it is binding could be ascertained before the state Legislature convenes in January. On this subject the committee was uniformly advised that the only time the state courts have intervened and determined the legal status of the statement was prior to the June election. At that time, or rather when the Secretary of State was preparing the ballot, a proceeding could have been brought restraining that official from having printed on the official ballot the designation of whether or not the various candidates were statement men, together with the text of that pledge. In that event it would have been possible to thrash the whole thing out in the courts and determine its constitutionality. But the election having been held and the Legislature elected, lawyers agree that the courts have no jurisdiction over that body.

### STUDENTS CLASH, 100 HURT

#### Scores Injured When Balcony Falls During Warring Factions' Fight.

VIENNA, Nov. 10.—An encounter between two warring factions of students attending the University of Vienna, resulted this morning in injury to about 100 of the young men. The cause of the conflict is to be found in the smoldering antagonism between the pan-German and the Jewish students. This bitter feeling broke out today, and led to a sanguinary encounter, which culminated in the collapse of a balcony in the university building. The pan-Germans gathered in force and stormed the staircase which leads to a balcony. The fighting for a few moments was fierce, but in the midst of it a portion of the balcony collapsed and over 100 students crashed to the ground. Most of them were injured, and some seriously.

### PACIFIC STOCKS ON JUMP

#### Union and Southern Advance Several Points on Big Buying.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Enormous buying here today that Emperor William and Union Pacific roads excited the stock market today and pulled the general range of prices up two points or more from a depression into which it had been forced by heavy profit-taking sales. Southern Pacific advanced six points above last night's close to 15 1/2. Union Pacific went up 2 1/2 points to 15 1/2. The market is expected to increase the dividend of the Southern Pacific to 7 per cent tomorrow were circulated. There were also reports that Southern Pacific had issued an issue of \$100,000,000 in bonds to retire its 7 per cent preferred stock.

### WHO WILL CARRY STATE VOTE?

#### At Least Two Oregon Electors Hope to Go East.

Who will carry Oregon's four votes for Taft and Sherman to the Electoral College? At least two of the four electors would appreciate the honor. R. R. Butler would like to be the messenger and his friends are urging that he be entitled to the privilege by reason of his effective three weeks' campaigning for the Republican ticket during the recent campaign. J. D. Lee, of this city, another of the electors, is an active aspirant for the place. Mr. Lee also did serviceable work for the Republican ticket and toured Eastern Oregon for its nominees. The wishes of State Senator F. J. Miller, of Albany, and A. C. Marsters, of Roseburg, the other two electors, have not been learned. The four successful electors are required to assemble at Salem early in January

and select one of their number to deliver the vote at the Electoral College, which meets in Washington the second Monday in January. Congress canvasses the vote of the Electoral College on the second Wednesday in February.

### Union Republican Club Meeting.

A call will be issued today for a meeting of the Union Republican Club for Friday night, when, it is reported, resolutions will be adopted declaring for the election of a Republican Senator at the coming session of the Legislature. Arrangements also are being made for meetings of the South Portland and the Seaside Republican Clubs, when similar resolutions will be presented for indorsement.

### GRAIN EXCHANGE IS OPEN

#### FIRST SESSION IN NEW QUARTERS IS HELD.

#### No Business Transacted, but Members Meet for Social Greetings and to Make Plans.

The Portland Merchants' Exchange began operations as a cash grain market yesterday. The meeting was held in its new quarters on the ground floor of the Board of Trade building, and was attended by almost every grain man in the city.

Several months ago the Portland Board of Trade established a grain department at which there was trading in both cash grains and futures. The Board of Trade venture, however, proved to be a failure, and the grain dealers, one by one, withdrew their support from it. The experiment left it when it was decided to permit dealing in futures, and the others dropped out for various reasons.

### Try to Improve Conditions.

In each of the cities where they stop the commission expect to confer with representative citizens interested in improving conditions among farmers; they will invite conferences with farmers themselves, with officials of state agricultural colleges, with representative citizens of all walks of life who are familiar with country life and every opportunity will be seized upon to gather data that will be of practical value in the solution of the problem laid before the commission by the President.

The commission will be headed by Professor L. H. Bailey, of Cornell University. The other members who will make this trip are Henry Wallace, of Iowa; K. L. Butterfield and W. H. Page, of New York City; Gifford Pinchot, National Forester, though a member of the commission, will be unable to make the trip as his work on the National Conservation Commission will detain him in Washington. The party will be accompanied by C. J. Blanchard, statistician of the Reclamation Service, through whom local arrangements are being perfected.

### No Long, Set Speeches.

In a letter discussing the coming trip, Professor Bailey said: "This commission is not appointed to investigate the farm or to inquire into technical agricultural processes. Its function is to give attention to the larger economic, social and sanitary questions of the open country. To this end, the commission would like to hear the opinions of representative farmers, teachers, business men, ministers, physicians and others who live in the open country, or who have direct relations with it. So far as possible we should like to meet accredited delegates from granges, farmers' clubs, and similar organizations, as well as farmers and others who come on their own responsibility."

Professor Bailey explains that owing to the shortness of time, the commission will spend but one day in each large city visited, but will devote the entire time to discussion with persons competent to talk upon the subject of proposed improvement of the home and social condition of the American farmer. These meetings will not be characterized by long, set speeches, but rather by informal discussion; the commission itself is going out to listen and learn and not to instruct or advise.
