She was arrested by police-men who had kept themselves in hiding at her home on Forty-sixth Place, immediately after handing over the pa-

The woman is 26 years of age and it is believed that the murder plot she cunningly devised was the effort of a diseased mind.

It was arranged between the agency and the police to carry out the affair. Accordingly Detective Mackay was in-

The arrangement received Miss Otis' sanction, and she further promised to pay the man who murdered her mother \$2500. ENCOUNTERS QUAKE AT SEA

German Training Ship Reports Thrilling Experience Off Coast.

ASTORIA, Or. Nov. 12.—(Special.)—
The German bark Herzogin Sophic Charlotte arrived in port this morning in ballast from Bremen after breaking all previous records from the English Channel to the Columbia River. The run was made in 105 days after a passage that was uneventful excepting that eight days ago, while about 140 miles off the Southern Oregon coast, there were a number of earthquake shocks, which were so sharp that those on board thought the vessel had struck a rock. The shocks occurred about 2 o'clock in the morning, and for a few moments the bark quivered and shock like a leaf, but suffered no damage.


