Bean Busy in Portland.

Representative L. E. Bean, of Lane, was busy yesterday with Multnomah members of the House, and received assurances which appeared to afford him some satisfaction from the Chamberlain-statement camp.

Although Bean is an anti-statement Representative, the Multnomah loss of McArthur viewed him as a convenient medium for taking strength from McArthur and for discouraging the statement camp.

Bean's friends said that their man had received considerable encouragement in Multnomah.

Bean was accompanied in Portland by J. A. Buchanan, of Douglas-Jackson, himself an anti-statement legislator, and apparently for geographical reasons, allied with the Lane man.

Bean figured that he can depend on the aid of his two Lane colleagues, Eaton and Collins, and other Southern Oregon counties.

Bean was interested in knowing Saturday whether Senator Fulton would throw his influence against him and make it a point to see Fulton on that very matter.

Senator Fulton replied:

"I shall take no hand in the organization of the Legislature, except to urge my friends to support the choices of the Republican caucus. I do not wish to stand in the way of any Republican aspirant for any place in the Legislature, not to boost any man over another. There are matters for Republican members to determine for themselves in caucus. I shall keep my hands off entirely."

Fulton Taking No Part.

Fulton's move of Statement Republicans in regard to Bean develops another political difficulty, on account of the candidacy of Representative Brady, of Multnomah, for the Speakership.

Brady has come to the fore in the last few days, expecting to receive the support of his statement colleagues in Multnomah.

Brady's movement in this county was not liked by Brady, and yesterday afternoon Brady announced his candidacy and demanded support in this county.

Statement Men in Caucus.

Brady announced his candidacy at a meeting of the Multnomah Statement Representatives in the Board of Trade building.

Orton made known that he himself was not out of the running, but Brady insisted that he had as much right to try for the place as anybody, and that he would have growing support in the outside counties.

All the Statement Representatives were present except W. J. Clemens, E. J. Jaeger was elected chairman and L. D. Malone secretary.

Beyond these matters, the Legislators would make nothing public. Their session was behind closed doors and no outsiders were admitted.

Statement legislators in this county will concentrate all their energy for election of Selling for President.

That has been made plain by members of the House delegation to the United States House of Representatives, a majority of them are resolved to support only a statement man for president in any event.

This means that they will oppose a Republican caucus. It is evident that they desire statement organizations in both houses, but are willing to trade off the Speakership if that will secure them the Presidency.

All Are Not Agreed.

In this effort to defeat Republican caucus and make Statement One paramount to party, not all the Multnomah statement Representatives will join.

Several of them will go into Republican caucus on organization, though they may not do so on the United States Senatorship.

Leaders of the statement camp in this county say that if they can hold the statement Legislators together in each house they can elect the President and the Speaker.

In the Senate are 12 statement Republicans and 7 Democrats, making 19 in all, or three more than a majority.

In the House are some 26 statement Republicans and 7 Democrats, making 33 in all, or two more
