Prisoner of Unusual Type. Miss Chapin is typically an English woman. In appearance, speech and manner, she is well educated, refined and strikingly handsome.

Her story of her present predicament in one of blind confidence in the man who was her associate in the business of miles from her home in England and now at Vancouver, who took only a passing interest in her. Here is the story of her elopement and the consequences, in her own words.

"Well, my health became poor and I thought I would have to quit work, but for a few days and that if I would stay and take two weeks' vacation. I would give me two weeks' vacation. I would give me two weeks' vacation.

"Before leaving, he gave me my week's wages. When Phillips met me he asked to borrow the money and then said I needn't work for Mr. O'Bryan any longer. I told him I would have to remain until Mr. O'Bryan had paid claims amounting to \$200.

"Phillips, or Caplin, then demanded that I get the money for him. I refused. He said that was the correct thing to do, as he would enable us to leave Seattle and get married. He told me that since the money was in my charge I should not get without getting it, and that all O'Bryan could do was sue me for breach of trust.

"Like a fool I did this. I got the drafts and turned them right over to Phillips. He got the money and we came on to Portland. When we arrived here he took the money and started in business with a woman tailor. Then he married a woman with four children. He at once began to pretend that he was worried because of my poor health. I told him I had heard from his husband in three years, and that he must be dead, but that to remove all doubts I'd get a divorce. He then wanted me to go to Spokane and go to work and wait for him there, even threatening to tell the police of the taking of those drafts.

"Insisted on Telling Police. "He even went so far as to start for the police station, saying he intended to tell on me. By this time I was sick and tired of the affair and was going to the station and telling the police.

"We were locked up for registering as man and wife without being really married. Then the wardens came and we were sent to Seattle. We are both under sentence of ten days, and I intend to see that the devil in the case gets his just deserts. He's the one that did the stealing if any man does. My only offense has been in allowing myself to become a confiding fool. But believe me, it is not constitutional, and once I get clear of this muck I shall be very wary about ever believing anything a man says. I've been fooled twice, but never will be again."

It is believed the Seattle authorities will send for the couple before the expiration of the ten days which they are now serving in the City Jail. Whether criminal charges rest against them in Vancouver is not yet positively known, although the young woman denies that anything wrong was done at that point.
