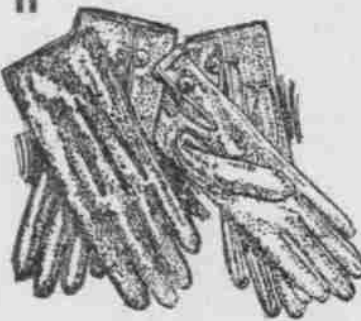

GUN MYSTERY DEEP

Haas' Possession of Revolver Still Baffling Problem.

MRS. COHN GIVES EVIDENCE

Says Heney's Assault Made Love to Her and Also Made Threats Against Life of Graft Prosecutor.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—The coroner's inquest upon the body of Morris Haas, who shot and killed himself in his cell in the County Jail after shooting Assistant District Attorney F. J. Heney, with the industry practically directed as to how he obtained or concealed the weapon with which he committed suicide, was resumed this morning. In support of the theory of the District Attorney's office that the little Derringer was passed to Haas after he was taken to the County Jail, Captain of Police Frank Pineda on the stand R. O. Brenner, a gun expert, who testified that had the weapon been concealed in one of Haas' shoes, the moisture from the body would have condensed on the metal and that the Derringer would show indications of rust. Policeman Grotte testified to being one of the officers who took Haas to the County Jail, accompanied by Chief of

Police Biggy. He was followed by Policeman John G. Attridge, who, with Detective Charles Kelley, was on duty in front of Haas' cell when Mrs. Haas came to see her husband. He described the meeting between the two, said that both he and Kelley were within two feet of the couple all the time that they were together and declared that it would have been impossible for the wife to have slipped the Derringer to Haas without it being observed by himself and Kelley. Mrs. Myriam Cohn, the closest friend the assailant of Mr. Heney had, was one of the principal witnesses. She came into the inquest room doubly veiled, and in response to the request of Coroner LeLend, could not be prevailed upon to remove more than one of the veils. She at first answered hesitatingly, but after being on the stand for a few minutes, regained her composure and seemed anxious to tell the jury all that she knew of Haas. Mrs. Cohn said that she had known Haas for 21 years, that she was practically his only confidant, and that he had often declared that he loved her, and that her marriage to another man had blasted his life. She testified that Haas said he was very anxious to get on the Reef jury in the Parkside case and he gave as his reason that he hoped the enforced seclusion for several weeks or months would cure him of his drink and tobacco habit. The witness said that Haas brooded over his exposure as a convict by Mr. Heney and told her he intended killing the special prosecutor for it. Asked by District Attorney Langdon why she did not inform the authorities, she replied that she thought she had talked him out of the idea.

GALLAGHER UNDER RAPID FIRE

Ach Rebuked for Delaying Progress. Haas' Double in Court. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—Superior Judge James L. Gallagher continued the trial of Abraham Ruef. In monotonous

repetition the witness was forced to go over again and again the various bribery transactions with the Board of Supervisors in which he said he had acted as the agent of Ruef. Henry Chiles, chief counsel for Ruef, directed such a rapid fire of questions at him that Gallagher lost his customary composure and plainly showed the effect of the grilling to which he was being subjected. An incident of the day was the appearance in the courtroom of an officer against Haas, a striking resemblance to Murray Haas, the assistant of Assistant District Attorney F. J. Heney, that he immediately attracted the attention of the dozen or more detectives and was the cynosure of all eyes. The man, whose identity could not be learned, remained but a few minutes in the courtroom.

BURNS PREFERS CHARGES

Makes Complaint Against Officers Who Guarded Haas' Door.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—William J. Burns, special agent of the District Attorney's office, charged today with the prosecution in the bribery graft investigations, last night filed with the Police Commission charges alleging conduct unbecoming an officer against Police Officer Charles B. Kelly and John C. Attridge, the two men detailed to guard the cell of Morris Haas, who shot Francis J. Heney and afterward committed suicide. In the complaint it is alleged that a few hours before Haas took his life the officers refused to permit Burns to enter the cell and examine the prisoner in the interests of the District Attorney's office. The hearing was set for November 27. At the same session of the board charges were preferred against Albert Baker, a Kearney-street saloonkeeper, who is alleged to have expressed satisfaction when he learned that Heney was shot and to have reviled his assistants in the prosecution. It is charged that Baker is an unfit person to hold a license to sell liquor.
