CAUTION IS ADVOCATED

Carnegie's Views on the Tariff Have the Effect of Checking the Upward Price Movement-With Recovery, Demand Falls Off.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Today's husiness at the Stock Exchange was the smallest for any day share the election. The rotal of 132,460 shares is the only daily total below 1,000,000 ahares that has occurred for a full day in that period. This subsidence of the speculative furors awakens some regret in many elements closely adjacent to the Stock Exchange, but in the larger financial circle of the Wall-street section there is an arowed satisfaction with the slowing down of a speculative pace which it was feared would trore perious and involve ulterior consequences that would be detrimental to the march of industrial and commercial progress of the country. This fear has found once expression in the past few days from many influential banking quarters.

The closed Interval since Saturday seemed to have been taken advantage of to disseminate this tow through the country. The wisdom of regulating the pulse of the recovery and of keeping down feverish symptoms was enforced from various sources. There is a tone of depreciation of any attempt at a sudden and violent boom in business. There were wearnings given also of unwarranted assumptions of the progress already schieved in the recovery and of the wiping out of possible obstacles to be encountered. In particular there is resilization that the assembling of Congress and the state Legislatures may bring some forces into action that will call especulative enthusiasm. It is supposed that this may follow from the too exuberant views that speculators have professed of the extent to which the anticorporation swntiment in the country has been appeared. 
