Well-known Portlander Passes Away in Colorado.

In the sudden death of Dr. Joseph M. Fox while visiting his daughter at Victor, Colo., this city loses an honored citizen whose passing will be sincerely mourned by all who through acquaintance and association had grown to respect and love him for his sterling qualities of mind and heart.

Born in Frankfort, Ky., in 1832, he early in life embraced the study of medicine, graduating with high honors at the age of 19 from Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, later following his profession with success and skill at Georgetown, Mo.

Upon the opening of the Civil War he enlisted and served with distinction until its termination upon the staff of General Price, making his home at its close for a number of years in St. Louis and removing with his family to Portland, Ore., as secretary of the Oregon Improvement Company, he remained until 1888.
