LONDON, Nov. 28.—(Special.)—Mme. Melba's predictions regarding the woman of the future are to a large extent supported by Lady Grove, whose new book, "The Human Woman," published a few days ago, is the latest word on the evolution of womanhood.

TRUST COMPANY CLOSES. Reorganized Institution Unable to Stand Strain.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—The Lafayette Trust Company, a reorganization of the Jenkins Trust Company, of Brooklyn, which went down in the financial panic of a year ago, did not open for business today. Announcement was made that the officers of the company had decided to permit the institution to go into liquidation.

It was said that the installment payments to depositors in the Jenkins Trust Company, provided for by the reorganization plan, had proved too severe a drain on the resources of the company, and also that the new officers had been embarrassed in their efforts to obtain new capital by members of the former management.

John G. Jenkins, Jr., who was president of the Jenkins Trust Company now is on trial in Brooklyn on a charge of grand larceny growing out of some of his acts while he occupied that position. The Superintendent of Banks took charge of the trust company today. An officer of the bank said depositors will receive 100 cents on the dollar.
