MILWAUKIE ELECTION TODAY

ONLY CONTEST IS FOR OFFICE OF MAYOR.

Philip Streib, Regular Nominee, Is Pitted Against William Schindler, the Present Executive.

Milwaukee's municipal election will be held today. Following are the candidates: Mayor, William Schindler, Independent candidate; Citizens—Mayor, Philip Streib; Recorder, Arthur Dowling; Marshal, Jesse Keck; Treasurer, E. T. Elmer; Councilmen, Isaac Mullan and Fred Lehman. The only contest is between Mr. Schindler and Mr. Streib. The latter was nominated without opposition at a citizens' meeting two weeks ago, and Mayor Schindler filed his petition a few days later as an independent candidate.

Mr. Schindler has been Mayor since 1905 and has always received the support of Mr. Streib, president of the Council. Two years ago Mr. Schindler announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election, and it is said that he agreed to support Mr. Streib for election. During the past six months the friendship between the Mayor and Councilman Streib was broken because the latter advocated an ordinance prohibiting stock running at large in Milwaukee. Mayor Schindler's friends then circulated a petition asking him to run again.

As there are no other candidates the Council will inaugurate the Mayor on Monday—John Keck and E. A. Sellwood, holdovers; Isaac Mullan and Fred Lehman. These men will have the handling of the negotiations with the Southern Pacific Railroad Company for a franchise, which is really the only issue in the election. The people are anxious to secure a depot on the Beaverton-Wilburg cut-off, which will pass through the heart of the town. Some of the other things wanted are as follows: Abolishing the poll tax; more street lights; better streets and sidewalks; amending Scott's addition; strict enforcement of the stock law; maintaining the revenue from license; procuring additional fire apparatus, and a 2-cent streetcar fare to Portland. There are 180 registered voters and a vote of 129 is expected today.

Cold Weather in Albany. ALBANY, Or., Dec. 6.—(Special).—The Government thermometer here, kept by E. M. French, United States Weather Observer, again reached 24 degrees above zero last night, equalling the mark of the night before, which is

the coldest weather reported in the Willamette Valley this winter.

DEATH COMES SUDDENLY

GEORGE F. JONES PASSES AWAY AT HIS HOME.

Had Been Oregonian Collector for Years and Was Widely Known About City.

George F. Jones, for 18 years a collector for The Oregonian, died suddenly at his home, 225 Mill street, at 9:30 o'clock last night. The sudden death of Mr. Jones came as a severe shock to the members of his family, as well as to his many friends made during his residence of 20 years in Portland. He was not believed to be dangerously ill, although he resigned his position one week ago on account of his health, which had not been good since he underwent an operation about a year ago.

Friday he complained of feeling weak, but as his condition was otherwise normal, no fears were entertained, and Saturday he was up and around the house. Last night he was attacked by a sinking spell and succumbed a few hours later. His daughter, Miss Ethel Jones, known on the stage as Miss Ethel Van Waldron, is on her way home from Spokane and is due to arrive this morning. As she has been in ignorance of her father's illness, the news of his sudden death will come as a severe shock to her. In addition to this daughter, the deceased is survived by his widow, whom he married in New York 30 years ago, and a son, Fred W. Jones, of 328 Cook avenue, and a young daughter, Miss Frances, who resides with her parents.

George F. Jones was born in New York City 53 years ago, and removed to Portland in 1857. Since then he has been employed almost continually on The Oregonian. He was a member of old Company G, of the First Regiment, U. S. A., which organization held a reunion a few weeks ago. The arrangements for the funeral will be made later.

TILLAMOOK, Or., Dec. 6.—(Special).—A vote is to be taken on Monday to annex Tillamook, Hoquiam, Fairview and South Prairie precincts to the Port of Tillamook.
