Not Much of Any Kind Left on the Eastern

Market.

There is but little Oregon wool of an kind on the Eastern market for sale, ac cording to the latest mail advices. About 10,000 pounds of No. 2 Valley sold at Boston at 32 cents, and Eastern fine staple at 12 6 20 cents in the grease is worth 62 to 52 cents clean in that market. Territories have wold rather freely in the past week, over 2,000,000 pounds changing hands. The largest transfers being a line of 500,000 pounds in the original bags, fine and medlum, at 21% cents in the grease, and 200, 600 pounds fine and fine medium Colorado on the scoured basis of 58 cents. Other good-sized transactions are 150,000 pounds fine and fine medium Soda Springs on the basis of \$6 cents and 100,000 pounds fine staple Wyoming at 62 cents. Smaller sales include fine and fine medium clothing wools, Titab. Wyoming, etc., at 16 to 18 cents, while neveral sales of fine Nevada are reporte at 17 cents. On a scoured basis, it is said, choice fine Nevada has sold at 60 cents. Medium wool has been selling at 21 to 24 cents, including three-eighths at 21 to 22 cents, and one-half blood at 23 to 24 cents. Montana fine staple is quoted at 22 to 23 cents. Not less than \$2 cents is quoted as the scoured basis of good fine staple and according to some dealers it is worth #5 cents
