

# ETHEL ROOSEVELT MAKES HER DEBUT

### President's Younger Daughter Is Formally Presented to Society at Capital.

## ALL YOUNGER SET ATTENDS

### House Party and Ball a Part of the Ceremonies Incident to the Roosevelt Beauty's Debut at Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—President Roosevelt's youngest daughter, Ethel, tonight made her formal bow to society, preceding the dancing in the east room of the White House, which began at 7 o'clock. Mrs. Roosevelt and Miss Roosevelt received the guests in the blue room. Miss Roosevelt's gown was of soft white satin trimmed with crystals, while her mother's was dark blue satin. The east room presented a more attractive picture. The invited guests numbered about 600, only unmarried members of the younger set participating in the dancing. Among those present were: Mrs. William S. Cowles and Miss Douglas Robinson, the President's two sisters; Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, Mrs. J. E. Roosevelt, Mrs. Simpkins, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Backs, Mrs. Charles A. Munn, Mrs. Richard Wayne Parker and Mrs. Herbert Wadsworth.

### Midnight Lunch Served.

At midnight the music ceased and the guests partook of a supper, which was served at small tables arranged along the lower corridor.

Preceding the ball Miss Roosevelt was the guest of honor at a dinner party given by Assistant Secretary and Mrs. Bacon. Covers were laid for 60, the whole party going later to the White House.

Mrs. and Miss Roosevelt are entertaining a house party for the dance. The party includes Miss Josephine Osborne, Miss Ellen H. Lander, Edmund Rogers, Monroe Robinson, Herbert Potter, Charles Emory and Norman Armour. They arrived at the White House shortly after luncheon.

### Has Many Friends.

Miss Ethel, who is regarded by many as the beauty of the President's family, is exceptionally popular in the capital. She has lived at the White House longer than any other President's daughter, and during her life there has become noted for her winning personality. She is also an adept horsewoman, always riding astride, and, unlike her sister Alice, is deeply interested in politics and often argues on matters of state with her father.

## HONOR BISHOP O'CONNELL

### Hanna, the Accused Modernist, Reported Turned Down.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—That Bishop Dennis G. O'Connell, rector of the Catholic University, has been appointed auxiliary bishop of San Francisco, is confirmed in a cablegram received from the Papal secretary of state, announcing that the Pope has made the appointment, and the Apostolic brief will be received within the next fortnight. The Roman authorities will now attend to the selection of the next rector. The list of candidates will leave today. The consensus of opinion still points to Bishop Carroll of Montana, as the next head of the Papal institution.

The term of Bishop O'Connell, who is at present spending some days at his old home in Charleston, S. C., as rector, expires January 11 next.

## ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 28.—Dr. Edward J. Hanna, who was a candidate for the Archbishopric of San Francisco and who was regarded as certain to receive the appointment, when some months ago charges of modernism were made against him, said today on being informed of the withdrawal of his name from the list of candidates for the see of San Francisco.

"The dispatch may be true, though it is strange that the announcement should come from Washington and not from San Francisco. I know nothing of the matter, but would hardly expect Rome to take action at this time."

## PASTOR COMMITS SUICIDE

### Deranged in Mind, Rev. R. L. Dougherty Cuts Throat.

FARGO, N. D., Dec. 28.—Falling to arrive at the church where his congregation had assembled for Sunday worship, a searching party was formed to locate Rev. Robert L. Dougherty, pastor of the Congregational Church at Buchanan, N. D., and on visiting his apartments the minister was found lying in a pool of his own blood. He had committed suicide. A razor, with which he killed himself, was gripped in the hand of the victim, while a rambling note was found on a table. His actions had been watched for some time by the people of Buchanan, who were not satisfied that he was in his right mind.

## KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 28.—Rev. Robert L. Dougherty, of Kansas City, Kan., members of his family today said they believed that the young preacher had taken a life following a mental breakdown, due to ill health and overstudy.

## IVERNA RAMS STEAMER

### Windjammer From Portland Strikes Small Coasting Vessel.

NEWCASTLE, N. S. W., Dec. 28.—The British steamer Advance and the British bark Iverna were in collision off here today. The Advance went down, with the exception of her first officer, all the members of her crew lost their lives. The Iverna put into Newcastle leaking badly.

The Advance mentioned in the foregoing dispatch appears to have been a local vessel of small dimensions.

The British bark Iverna sailed from Portland the last time January 15, 1907. She was then under charter to the Portland Flouring Mills and carried a heavy cargo. She is in command of Captain Collinswood, who is well known to the shipping fraternity.

## WILL HASTEN TRIAL

### Pittsburg Councilmen Eager to Pass Ordeal.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 28.—Attorneys for the prosecution in the alleged corrupt practices of Pittsburg Councilmen and two former bankers under arrest declared the trials are to be urged to a speedy conclusion. District Attorney Hakeley disposed of the cases before the municipal election in February, at which the Councilmen arrested are candidates for reelection. Attorneys for the defendants say that they will be ready to meet the charges at any time.

## WORKING OF GRAFT GAME

### Bankers Had Roundabout Way of Paying Bribes—Some Careless Grafters Wrote Checks Which Will Become Evidence.

In connection with the alleged bribing of Councilmen by bankers to secure deposits of city funds, it is said the plan followed was to have the bank's New York correspondents forward the amount of the alleged corruption fund to another Pittsburg bank to the credit of the Councilmen negotiating the bribery deal, he to make distribution to the other Councilmen. Some of the defendants admitted through safety deposit boxes, but others wrote checks against the fund. It is said a number of these checks will be presented as evidence.

## SPRECKELS' FUNERAL HELD

### Body of Sugar King Laid Away With Simple Ceremonies.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—The funeral of the late Claus Spreckels, whose death took place last Saturday, was held this afternoon. At the Howard-street residence of the widow, where hundreds of friends have called to pay their tribute of sorrow, there was a brief religious service conducted by Rev. Julius Fuending, pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church. A quartet rendered a number of simple hymns and the heavy bronze casket was carried to the waiting hearse. At Valencia street the casket was transferred to a funeral car and carried to the Spreckels' mausoleum in Cypress Lawn cemetery. By request of the family, none except relatives and intimates accompanied the remains to the cemetery.

The honorary pallbearers, all of whom were close friends of the dead capitalist, were: E. N. East, W. H. Hopkins, Robert Oxnard, W. G. Irwin, John Scott Wilson, Captain H. L. E. Meyer, Dr. L. L. Dorr and Charles Holbrook.

Messages of condolence and regret have been received from every part of the world and scores of floral offerings came from friends at home and abroad. On nearly every large office building in the city a flag was today displayed at half mast.

## GERMANY SEEKS MINIMUM

Democratic caucus of the House, today said on tariff revision: "It is not sufficient for the Democrats in the Congress to assume an attitude of simple negation and merely oppose what the Republicans offer. We must formulate an entire tariff bill, covering every schedule, and go to the committee of the whole with it, champion it, demand revision on its every schedule, and ask for the yeas and nays on it in the House. The bill should be carefully considered in principle and in detail, in short, it should be a message we can go to the country on."

"Then we are to have, so it is said, the maximum and minimum, which is another name for reciprocity. Of course, the Republicans will insist upon making the maximum as big as they dare, but our bills might fix it for the minimum in some schedules, and we should press it."

"We want a complete bill to go to the country in 1910."

## DIRE THREAT MADE

### Son of Noted French Novelist Talks of Sudden Death.

PARIS, France, Dec. 28.—(Special.)—The disconcerted political elements evidently mean to see just how far Premier Clemenceau will allow them to go in the campaign of unexampled vituperation against Republican officialdom. At a meeting of the anti-Republican forces held Saturday night an address was delivered by Leon Daudet, son of the peaceful and kindly novelist.

Among other violent statements made by him was one to the effect that if M. Clemenceau came to the speaker's house he would see to it that somebody asserted that Mattie, the waiter who assaulted President Fallieres, was really the one to be pitied since the great "Republican" fell upon him.

Other speakers, equally abusive, followed, giving proof that royalist agitation, hopeless as it may be, is nevertheless now active.

## BEARD PULLER IS ROYALIST

### Mattie, Who Attacked French President, Watched by Police.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—The investigation by the police into the Mattie incident has revealed Mattie's relations with the Yellow Syndicate, a Royalist organization, and as a result the police yesterday sealed up the offices of the newspaper prepared by the organization. The editor of this paper is Pierre Bietrie, a deputy from Finistere. Last night he defied the orders of the police and broke into his office.

Mattie is the unemployed waiter who waylaid President Fallieres on the street and made an attempt to pull his beard.

## NEW BOSSES LIKE OLD

### FORD, OF PRINCETON, DRAWS PARALLELS IN HISTORY.

Declares American State Not Suited to Responsibilities of True Democracy.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—With James Bryce, British Ambassador, presiding, the American Political Science Society met here tonight in its first annual gathering. The general topic for consideration was "The Increase of Federal Power and Power in the United States." One of the principal papers was by Stephen Leacock, McGill University, Canada, on "The Limitations of the Federal Government."

In the course of the discussion Professor Henry Jones Ford, of Princeton University, declared that neither the power nor the responsibility essential to democratic rule was embodied in the American state. "The resemblances," he said, "that historians are now noting between ancient and modern bosses, grafters and spoilsmen rest upon substantial identity, affording a fine demonstration of the universal principle that like causes produce like effects, irrespective of the intentions with which the causes are put in operation."

He asserted that efforts of reformers were directed against conditions from which the power was gained rather than

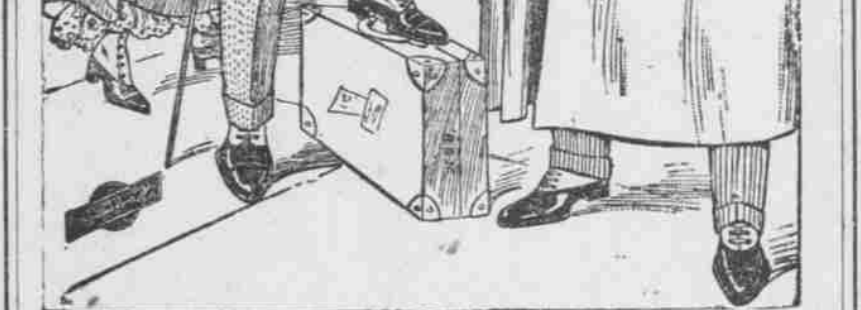
## Hotentots Take Warpath.
