COLD WAVE SENDS QUOTATIONS UP AT SEATTLE.

Famine in Eggs Is Feared-Fancy Onions Advance to \$12 Per Sack. .

SEATTLE. Wash, Jan 5.—(Special.)—
The cold wave put a damper on trading and stiffened prices on nearly every commodity offered on Western avenue.
