last four years as an indication of the
healthful state of American civilization.
In his experiences in the North and South
and in the Philippines, he said, he had
been able to study many different phases
of civilization, especially in the matter
of church influences.

Church Is Indispensable.

'Leaving out the distinctions of sect." he continued, 'the indispensiable presence of church influence in the improvement of our civilization no one can be to who has shared in the slightest the responsibility for Government and the re sponsibility for improvement of a people as I have. That was a responsibility in respect to a race that is now in a state of Christian tutelage and must be uplifted in my judgment, by us and through our guidance, before we shall have discharged the obligations that providence has through the charge the c

Religion in Philippines.

And in the study of their develop-"And in the study of their develop-ment has become known to me the enor-mous influence that the church must ex-ercise in order to make our progress there effective. The Roman Catholic Church was there for years and pre-served that state of Christian tutelage to which I have referred. Now the ban has been removed from other denomina-tions and they are all in there on an equality in the spirit of Christian emula-tion, attempting to unlift those people tion, attempting to uplift those people and we, for the Government, by a system of secular education, are alding that uplifting; but without the moral influence of the churches we could not accom-plish anything. It is that sort of expe-rience by which there is borne in upon us e importance of the maintenance of church and its influence at all haz-

"It is difficult sometimes to explain to one who has been used to the close union of church and state, such as was preserved in Spain, such as is preserved in some other countries, the real atti-tude of the American Government toward the church. Cold Wave Sweeps Over All Northwest and Heads for Sunny South.

MERCURY HIDES IN BULB

Temperatures From 2 to 40 Degrees Below Zero Are Reported Throughout Middle States-No Relief From Cold in Sight.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8 — (Special.) — Long-deferred Winter swept over Chicago and the entire Northwest today, and is rapidly enveloping the Middle West. is rapidly enveloping the Middle West. Forecasters say the cold wave will extend clear to Florida and Louisiana. Throughout Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and Canada there is heavy snow and sleet, accompanied by a very low temperature. In Illinois and the other Middle Western States the cold wave was accompanied by a cold rain and snow flurries, which out down telegraph and telephone wires, disrupted railway schedules and brought much suffering in the poorer districts of cit-les. The coldest point was at Qu' Appelle.

where the mercury registered 46 below zero. Duluth, Minn., has 29 below. At Medicine Hat, the fountain-head of all cold weather, the temperature was 22 below. San Antonio, Tex., showed a maximum of 72 and a minimum of 65 above.

Twenty-seven cities reported below zero, the reading ranging from 2 to 40 degrees. Everywhere there was either snow or rain, and in nearly all parts of the disputched zone thore was intensely cold, atinging sleet. Weather experts say the present cold wave will increase in intensity and that it is here to remain, with scant intervals, until April.

Weather Bureau Report Shows Cold Weather From Coast to Coast.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—The barometer is low over the entire Atlantic Coast region, and the heaviest snow is centered off Hatteras. Rains were general during Tuesday in the Eastern states and some snow fell in Northwest sections. A storm which is centered in the Pacific Coast region is causing general precipitation from the Rocky Mountain region westward to the coast.
