OBJECTS TO THEIR TERMS

Prisoner Accuses Piggott of Trying to Seize All His Property. Lord Gives His Side of Controversy.

C. H. Piggott, W. W. Holcomb, Charles F. Lord and W. C. Campbell, attorneys for James A. Finch, the convicted murger of Ralph B. Fiaher, have realigned as his counsel. Piggott says it is because they were not remunerated. Finch says it is because they were not remunerated. Finch says it is because Piggott tried to hold him up. Finch letterly denounces his former law partner, although he does not say that the other attorneys have not treatthat the other attorneys have not treated him fairly. Finch says he intends to have his case taken into the Federal court, where he expects a new trial. He says he will never pay the death penalty. He had not secured an attorney last

night.
"I can see hope now that Piggott has resigned," continued Finch, "but I could see no hope the other way. He wanted me to deed over to him all my property, leaving my mother and wife with nothing. Then, after I had done that, he would have been gind to have seen me. would have been glad to have seen me out of the way so I wouldn't be bother-ing him about it."

Finch said he deeded Piggott 12 lots in

Finch said he deeded Piggott 12 lots in Fulton Park, worth about \$500, with the understanding that Piggott was to still the property and give Mrs. Finch \$250, keeping the other half for himself and the three other attorneys. In addition to this he says his wife was to pay Pagott \$700 in cash. He asserts that Piggott owes him between \$1500 and \$1600 as his share of the law partnership.

Finch says that he owns a fifth interest in the Smith tract, at Flavel, near Astoria, of which Governor Chamberian is the trustee. He declares that this is worth \$10,000. Piggott wanted him to deed this over, he says, besides his wife's cottage at Tremont station, on the Mount Scott carline. A portion of this property is now held by Piggott to secure the bonds of C. H. and C. H. T. Atwood, against whom charges of malpractics were lodged, but who have not yet been riled. Their ball is \$1000 each.

Finch complained yesterday that a week has passed since his conviction, during which time Piggott, Finch says, has done nothing except try to force upon him an agreement to give op all his property.
"He told me if I didn't sign one of these two agreements," said Finch, "he would do nothing more to prevent the halter from being drawn about my neck Pehruary 5. He told me I was only driving nails in my coffin. When he couldn't get my property by calofing me, he tried to

my property by cajoling me, he tried to do it by threats. Bloger & Wilson are endeavoring, with my wife, to secure the services of an attorney who is now out t the city." Mr. Lord in discussing his withdrawal

"My withdrawal from the case and also that of W. W. Holcomb was for the reason that it appeared to be the desire of Finch. As we both have given our best endeavors on behalf of Finch and without remuneralism, or means to properly handle the matter, we feel it is uncharitable at this time to bring us into the limelight and charge us with failure properly to protect the rights of the man.

So far we have done everything possible, I believe, to protect the rights of Finch and I am sure Finch's rights will be looked after in the future, if not by us then by those who succeed us in his behalf."
