IS CHARGED WITH LAND GRAB

Executive Presents Evidence in Senator's Letters.

DEAL WAS "GOOD GAMBLE"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—President Roosevelt tonight made public details of an investigation by Postoffice Inspectors and Secret Service agents of Senator Tillman's connection with an alleged "land grab" in Oregon.

That Mr. Tillman used his influence as a Senator in an effort to force the Government to compel a railroad corporation to relinquish its control of land grants from the United States in order that he and his family and his secretary, J. E. Knight, might profit through the purchase of some of the land.
